**A LAST CONFERENCE.**

Cuban Delegation Called Upon President McKinley.

THE POLITICAL SETTLEMENT.

The President Gave No Hope of Action Before the Formation of Their Government.

Washington, D. C., Special.—The Cuban delegation completed its business in Washington Saturday. In the morning the delegates met Secretary Root and went with him to the White House where they had a final talk with the President. Then they paid visits of courtesy to each of the officials whom they have met and finally they started for New York at 11 o'clock at night, homeward bound. They will sail for Havana Wednesday. The proceedings at the White House were interesting and important.

Senator Capote acted as spokesman for the delegation. He thanked the president for the many courtesies shown them, which they accepted as an expression of good will to the Cuban people. He invited the president to visit Cuba, to see for himself the conditions in the island and learn for himself the love and affection which the Cubans have for the United States and their appreciation of what has been done for them by this government in their struggle for freedom.

Senator Capote asked the president to do something for the Cubans upon an economic basis, and especially in the matter of reciprocity in trade relations. He said that it was especially desirable to have something of this kind done before the next crop was harvested in order that the Cubans might realize the advantages to them of closer political and economic relations with the United States.

In reply the president said it was impossible to settle economic questions until the political questions were disposed of. He told the delegates to first form their government and then they would be in a position to enter into negotiations with the United States as to trade relations.

Senator Capote responded that something ought to be done while the Cuban government was forming. He thought that while the United States was exercising control there might be arrangements perfected similar to those under contemplation by the secretary of state in 1902, when the present constitution was under control of the United States. He said the president that the Cuban people did not wish to be torn in party strife and war and if at least preferred to have something with which to support itself and to have its people in prosperous conditions immediately before the war.

The president again referred to the fact that under the present conditions as the secretary of state had advised them he did not see how it was possible to settle any economic questions before the Cuban government was formed. He would appoint a commission independent of a government was organized for reciprocal trade relations and he believed that the United States would be ready to deal in a manner which would be beneficial to both countries. He thanked the delegation for the invitation to visit the island and told them to assure the Cuban people of his friendly interest in them and his desire to see them contented and prosperous.

Senator Capote, speaking to Secretary Root, expressed the hope that in the interviews they had been having, that he had said nothing in his address which was in any way offensive. The secretary replied that on the contrary he highly appreciated the arguments of Senator Capote and his knowledge of the questions had increased his admiration and respect for the legal abilities and keenness of the Cuban people.

The delegates then shook hands with the president and departed. Their captain inquired of an Associated Press reporter.

"We have concluded our business here. We have had three interviews with the president and four with the secretary of state, during which time all matters that we came here to discuss have had the fullest and most intimate consideration. We came to confer the relations between Cuba and the United States and these, both political and economic have, been given most careful attention. We return to Cuba and will deliver to the constitutional convention all the information we have obtained, much of which is highly important."

**A Court Decision.**

The Missouri Court of Appeals has rendered a decision in a case involving the taxing power of municipalities in reference to franchise taxes.
