This is generally done in one or both of two ways as follows: First, by opening up new markets and second by putting the supply to new uses in markets already in fx stence. Of course when the supply exceeds the de mand, if there be any infirm articles in stock, it is but natural to find them among the surplus. When the supply exceeds the demand, a shod dy grade of goods may frequently be found for sale at or below cost; nevertholess such goods are dear in the
