About Anonymous Articles.

It may seem strange to readers of newspapers that the names of writers are invariably required before the publication of communications sent to the office, and although every newspaper in the land has explained the reason time and again, hardly a week passes in any office that anonymous articles are not received. Obituaries and marriages would seem to be exempt from this rule, but even the solemnity of death does not deter some persons from perpetrating a hoax by sending false information to a newspaper, as was done quite recently in one of the most careful and reputable newspapers in the State. Marriages are made the occasion for a joke, and shallow jaded youths think it smart to get the editor to chronicle a marriage that never took place by signing a fictitious name or otherwise using deceptive means to accomplish this end. Hence it is safest to require a responsible name to every communication, not necessarily to be made public, but for the protection of the newspaper and the innocent parties who may be involved in manufactured statements. It is frittering away time to send anonymous articles to this office, but a capacious waste basket is quite handy to the editor's desk, and this is the receptacle in which they are invariably placed.

Col. Tripp and Mr. Shaw.

Orders have been issued by the officers of the Southern railway notifying station agents and others that Col. A. Tripp has been appointed assistant superintendent and Mr. E. H. Shaw division agent, headquarters at both these gentlemen being at Blackshear. Their duties extend over that part of the Charleston division lying between Kingsville and Sumter and Marion, N. Two Deserters Pass Through Camden.

Chief Partlow left with his prisoners on the 8 o'clock train for Norfolk where they were to be delivered upon the steamer "Franklin."

Sudden Death of Mrs. A. Porter Haskell.

"One of the saddest deaths recorded in Columbia in years occurred yesterday (Sunday) afternoon. Mrs. A. Porter Haskell died very suddenly. Mr. and Mrs. Haskell were driving into the city in a buggy from their home about three miles from the city. Mrs. Haskell was suddenly seized with neuralgia of the heart just as they were passing the orphanage. The serious nature of the attack neither realized and they hastened on into the city to the residence of Mr. Haskell's father, Judge A. C. Haskell, where they expected to spend the day. In about 10 minutes after arriving there Mrs. Haskell expired."

"Mrs. Haskell was a lovable young woman, about 25 years old, the daughter of Mr. Nicholas Austin Black of this county, and became Mr. Haskell's wife in April of last year. She leaves a little son just 23 months old, Alexander C. Haskell, third."

"The funeral services will be held at the residence of Judge Haskell on Senate street at 6 o'clock this afternoon and the interment will be at Elmwood cemetery."
