

## Current News.

Kansas City has an organization, known as the Employers' Protection, Association, which is worthy of note, that it indicates possible important development of the controversy and attendant troubles between capital and labor. Though but recently founded the association has grown very rapidly and is now powerful, for it has on its membership roll the more important employes of labor of the city, excepting those of the implement and packing house districts. The purpose of the association, as explained by its officers, is to afford protection against certain demands often made by labor unions. It is not, on the other hand, opposed to the organization of labor. The association has already had opportunity to act. When, a few days ago, union men assaulted a party of nonmion men, the association promptly offered \$500 reward for the arrest and conviction of the men or any of the men responsible for the trouble. The police board of Kansas City promised o co-operate with the association in its efforts to see that the law is maintained, and showed on this occasion that it was in earnest by causing extensive transfers because the police seemed to be at fault. King Edward, during his recent stay


