For State missions, \$79.75 were contributed; home missions \$40.50, foreign missions \$113.20, Conate Maxwell orphanage \$58.28, ministerial education \$20, aged ministers relief fund \$30.50. During the year 42 additions have been made to the church—28 by baptism, 13 by letter and none by re-ordination. The decrease is, 9 by letter and 6 by death. The present membership of the church is 257. The report sent to the Synod Association which met yesterday in Manning is one of the best ever made by this church.
