

Assessors and taxpayers will taker the first given name of the taxpayer in full, also make a separate return for each party for the township the property is in Beginning at the opening of the present school year, July the lat, teachers must use in their schools the new School Reg-ister, which may be had on application at this office. Claims will not be approved unless made where the tax payer owns realty to insert the postoffice as their place of residence, and those who only own per-sonal property to give the party's name who owns the land they live on, and in each and every case to name the No. of School District the property is in.

All personal and real Property owned on the 1st day of January, 1904, must be returned for taxation, and all changes or transfers of real estate noted.

STONES ? !

In order to avoid confusion, parties making returns should state number of acres of land owned at time of making fast returns in columns marked 'Rea Property.' Any real estate acquired on transferred since last returns should be entered in columns for that purpose giv-lag name of party or parties from when

bought or to whom sold. All new buildings should be returned as "Real Property" acquired since last return.-

INCOME TAX.

Under the recent Act of the Legisla are all persons having a gross income of Tweenty-five Hundred Dollars of more are required to make a return o he same to the Auditor at the time o making their other returns.

THE POLL TAX. The new Constitution which went in to full operation after the Sist of Decem her, 1895, provides for a poll tax of One Dollar upon all citizens of this State between the ages of Twenty-One and Sixty years, excepting Confederate sol-diers above the age of Fifty years. Par-ties making returns for the fiscal year 1904 will bear in mind this Con-titational provision and govern themselves accordnglv.

All returns must be made on or be fore the 20th day of February next. cannot take returns alter that date as
