STEAMER SINKS IN STORM

The Call Goes Down in the Gulf of St. Lawrence.

HAD BIG ENGINES ON BOARD

Was a Bremen passenger steamer between New Brunswick, N. S., and Prince Edward Island, all of those lost were steerage passengers. Four men of the crew were wounded.

It is said that the steamer left at the time of the wreck of the "Lusitania." Father Edward Schmid, a popular singer, with his wife, it is believed, or all of his crew, some fifteen souls, of whom fourteen were passengers, all men. Among these on the steamer was the son of John Egan, of New York City, one of the principal owners.

The Call was a new vessel, and had been engaged during the last six months in trading between New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island ports on a regular and safe service. The steamer was bound from Truro, Nova Scotia, to Northern New Brunswick, to New London, on the northern coast of Prince Edward Island. It had been the custom of the Call to stop on her way down the coast, and it is thought that her passengers were nearly all fishermen.

The storm came with great severity in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, blowing directly on the north shore of Prince Edward Island. The harbor of New London is a difficult one to enter, and while the majority of the crew were missing, it was held at first that the little vessel was caught in the gulf by the storm, and was either carried on the ledge at the entrance of the harbor or foundered a short distance off the shore.

The Call was owned originally in Clifton, N. B., and was built within a year. She was about 300 tons burden.
