No Hope of Killing Boll Weevil.

The department of agriculture at Washington issued a report on the results of recent investigations by Special Agent Hunter of the bureau of entomology, giving recommendations looking to averting damage by the boll weevil. The report says that the work of the bureau of entomology for several years has indicated that there is not even a remote probability that the boll weevil ever will be exterminated and that as a matter of fact no injurious insect ever has been exterminated. It says, however, that although the large yields of former times no longer may be possible in the region now infested by the boll weevil, it is entirely feasible to produce cotton at a margin of profit that will compare favorably with that resulting from the production of most of the staple crops of the United States by following what is known as the cultural method. This consists of changes and modifications of the system of cotton raising, including the destruction of the plants in the fall, early planting, thorough cultivation of the fields, planting the rows as far apart as feasible, thinning the plants in the rows and using certain fertilizers.

"It is our policy to steer clear of permanent alliance with any portion of the foreign world."

"Harmony, liberal intercourse with all nations, are recommended by policy, humanity and interest."

Perhaps these golden words are considered antique, out of date and visionary. Yet, they will go ringing down the ages. The President who scores and violates them will stand in history as one who betrayed his country and immortalized Liberty on the unholy altar of imperial ambition.

Let us hope that our President will venerate the mighty shade of Washington and be true to his warning counsel.—Augusta Chronicle.
