In strictly enforcing the ordinance prohibiting vagrancy, the provisions should be enforced to the letter so that when a tramp enters the city he will never get a foot in the town again, and his presence will serve as a warning to all who think Camden is the place to go to for work.

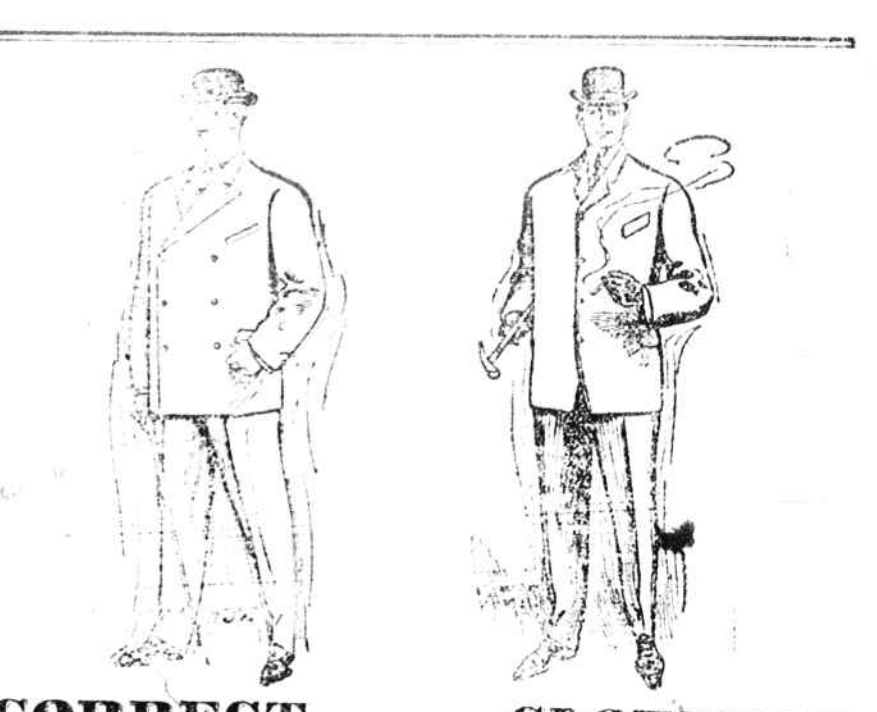
