An Ordinance.
 To Divide The City Of Camden Into (6) Six Wards.
 Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Camden, S. C.,
 1. That the City of Camden is hereby divided into six (6) wards. Ward one (1) shall consist of all that portion of the City south of Rutledge Street, the boundary line to extend in a straight line from the Eastern to the Western limit of the City. Ward two (2) shall consist of all that portion of the City between Rutledge Street and DeKalb Street, the boundary lines extended East and West in a straight line to the limits of said City. Ward three (3) shall consist of all that portion of the City lying between DeKalb and Latture Streets, the Eastern boundary being the high water mark of Little Pine Tree Creek and the Western boundary being the continuation of Wylie Street of the City of Camden. Ward four (4) shall consist of all that portion of the City lying between Laurens and Boundary Streets, the Eastern boundary being the high water mark of Little Pine Tree Creek and the Western boundary being the continuation of Wylie Street of the City of Camden. Ward five (5) shall consist of all that portion of the City North of Boundary Street and East of Littleton Street, and bounded on the North by a line running East and West and marked by four stone posts a Little North of Kirkwood and Hobkirk Hill, on the East by the high water mark of Little Pine Tree Creek, on the South by Boundary Street and on the West by Littleton Street. Ward six (6) shall consist of all that portion of the City North of Boundary Street and West of Littleton Street, and bounded on the North by the said line marked by four stone posts on the East by Littleton Street, on the South by Boundary Street, and on the West by the continuation of Wylie Street, of Camden.
