The City Election.

After a close race for Mayor and Aldermen for another term, the election is over. Politics no longer disturb the public mind. Whatever may have been the differences of rival factions, whatever influence each may have exerted for its respective candidates—all is now behind us. Successful and unsuccessful candidates should willingly bury the political hatchet and endeavor to pull together for the betterment and prosperity of the city.

One cannot overestimate the responsibility of the city officials. In their hands rests either the progress or the retrogression of Camden. We have full confidence in the ability of our "City Fathers," and feel assured they will work conscientiously, dispassionately and judiciously for the public good.

What the community needs is sewerage; also arc lights and the improvement of streets in the annexed districts and the filling in of ditches generally. The Council we are sure will give all these matters proper consideration.

Above all let there be concerted action. Let all factions work for one goal. Let every citizen cooperate with the Council. The result will be the uplifting and advancement of Greater Camden.

Trees In A City.

The following reasons are given by a civic league for the planting of trees in a city:

1. They increase the value of surrounding property.
2. They protect the pavement from the heat of the sun.
3. They add beauty and comfort to the city streets.
4. They cool the air in summer and radiate the warmth in winter.
5. They purify the air; the leaves inhale carbonic acid gas and exhale oxygen.
6. They aid in counteracting the unnatural conditions of city life.

Attorney General U. X. Gunter is hopelessly ill at his home in Bateburg.

Mr. Gunter was born in Bateburg, Lexington county, on December 5, 1870. Mr. John Gary Evans, on being elected governor, appointed Mr. Gunter private secretary. He afterwards became clerk of the claims committee of the house of representatives, removing at the close of this work to Spartanburg to practice law. He was made assistant attorney general under Mr. W. A. Barber in 1898 and was re-appointed by General G. Bunce Bellinger, who succeeded Mr. Barber.

In 1902 Mr. Gunter was nominated, over Mr. W. E. Stevenson, in the Democratic primary, as the candidate for attorney general, and was elected at the general election in that year. He was re-elected without opposition in 1904 for the term to expire during the next session of the general assembly.

Senator B. R. Tillman stated to Senator Niels Christensen, Jr., in Washington a few days ago that he would come down into South Carolina this summer and defeat for reelection every legislator who voted against the Baysor-Manning bill.

Now that the city campaign is about over why not start the County ball to rolling? Candidates are a little backward this year. On the 25th of March, two years ago nineteen candidates had been announced.




