A Statement from Mr. Sowell Regarding the Boundary Line Between Kershaw and Lancaster Counties.

Editor of The Camden Chronicle:—I desire to make a brief statement in regard to the recent survey and location of the boundary line between Kershaw and Lancaster Counties made by authority of the Board of Commissioners of Kershaw County as there seem to be erroneous impressions on the part of some in regard to this matter.

The line between the two counties, as prescribed by the Legislature, in the Statute of 1892, the last on the subject, had never, so far as known, been located by actual survey, and the determination of this boundary line had become a matter of necessity for the proper conduct of the business of the County. All attempts to have a survey under legislative enactment had failed owing to obstruction interposed in some quarters. The Commissioners of Kershaw County, being thwarted in securing any relief through the Legislature, determined themselves to have the line laid down on the land by a competent engineer, in accordance with the description of the boundary in the last act fixing the same.

Before taking the step, however, an invitation was extended to the Board of County Commissioners of Lancaster to co-operate with the Kershaw County Board in making this survey and settling all disputes and doubts in regard to this line. The Lancaster Board declined to accede to the proposition, and the Kershaw Board proceeded to locate the line for itself. The Commissioners of Kershaw County fully believe that the survey they have made is a correct location of the boundary, and they expect to claim jurisdiction to that line. Taxpayers who recognize that line, and pay their taxes to Kershaw County, will receive the support of the Kershaw County Board.

State Very Rich In Mineral Wealth.

Dr. Geo. F. Lee, a mining expert and mineralogist, formerly of Dublin, Ireland, and now of Kershaw county, South Carolina, was in the city yesterday in the interest of a company to be formed to mine gold, tin and aluminum in Kershaw and Lancaster. Dr. Lee is a graduate of Heidelberg and Edinburgh universities and came to this country about two or three years ago well recommended.

"South Carolina is rich in mineral wealth," said Dr. Lee, "far richer than the ordinary citizen supposes and some examinations I have made bear out the recent reports made by your State geologist, Mr. Earl Stenn. There is not only gold but iron ore and a clay that is a substitute for white lead. I find this clay fully equal to that now mined in Pennsylvania and in Germany and vast beds of it are untouched."

Dr. Lee has also inspected the Kaolin bed in the upper part of Richland county and his report bears out what has already been written of them in the State from time to time. The gold ore to which he refers pays about \$70 to the ton of quartz and the vein extends from the vicinity of Lugoff, on the Seaboard Air Line Railroad, on through to Lancaster, with branches up into York and Chester counties. He had several specimens of the quartz with him for exhibition which were left with local men who may become interested in the formation of a mining company.—The State.

All South Carolina mourns the death of Gen. LeRoy F. Youmans which occurred last Monday morning. The Columbia State pays the following high tribute to him: "When the history of the South Carolina Bar is prepared there will be but one name considered for pre-eminence in his generation in the combined attributes of learning, eloquence and brilliancy. In that position LeRoy F. Youmans stood alone a quarter of a century ago, and there is now none to take his place."

After deliberating all night over their verdict, the trial committee, clothed by the Methodist conference with full powers to dispose of the charges of gross immorality brought against the Rev. C. W. Creighton, came to an agreement at 7 o'clock Wednesday morning, finding that the specifications proved sustained the charge, and depositing the accused from the ministry and expelling him from the membership of the church.

A recent decision by the United States supreme court places the shipment of whiskey into the State of South Carolina under the interstate commerce law until the goods are delivered into the possession of the consignee, so that consignment may not seize liquor in the railroad depots which has been shipped from another State.

The directors of the Southern railway have elected W. W. Finley of Washington president of the company, to succeed the late Samuels Spencer. Mr. Finley has been second vice president of the road since Sept. 15, 1896. He has been active in railway work since 1875.
