Col. J. O. Boyd Paralyzed.

Greenville, Dec. 31.—Col. John C. Boyd, adjutant and inspector general was stricken with paralysis this afternoon, between 4 and 5 o'clock, while he was visiting his daughter on College street. The stroke was very sudden. In speaking of his condition to-night the attending physician said that he considered Col. Boyd seriously ill, and he doubts very much if he will be able to take the oath of office on Jan. 15. The attack was on the right side and that side is utterly helpless this evening. The Colonel has been conscious at all times since the stroke and said tonight that he had been feeling unwell only today.

Jan. 4.—The latest reports from Col. Boyd is that his condition is not encouraging.
