Lowell has written in the lines quoted below, a more perfect tribute than even we who loved her most could write in prose to the memory of one whose life among us was that of a ministering angel and more than any woman I have ever known her sweet nature spontaneously fulfilled those cardinal virtues, a gentle charity and a broad humanity.

She is a woman, one in whom The springtime of her childhood years Hath never lost its fresh perfume Though knowing well that life hath room For many blights and many tears.

She doeth little kindnesses That most leave undone or despise For naught that sets one heart at ease And giveth happiness or peace Is low esteemed in her eyes.

Blessing she is, God made her so And deeds of week-day holiness Fall from her noiseless as the snow Nor hath she ever chanced to know That aught were easier than to bless."
