PROCLAMATION.

State of South Carolina—Executive Department.
 To the Commissioners of Election for the County of Kershaw:—
 Whereas a vacancy exists in the office of Judge of Probate for the County of Kershaw, caused by the death of J. B. Phelps, who was elected at the General Election in 1904:
 Whereas the unexpired term is for a longer period than one year, and can only be filled by election:
 Now Therefore, you are required to order an election for Judge of Probate for Kershaw County, to serve the remainder of the term for which J. B. Phelps was elected:
 The polls to be opened the first Tuesday in April, the 2nd, A. D. 1907, and the election to be conducted according to the laws regulating the General Elections. In Testimony Whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of the State to be affixed at Columbia, this 28th day of February, A. D. 1907 and in the One Hundred and Thirty-first year of the Independence of the United States of America.

Notice Of Election.

State of South Carolina, Kershaw County.
 In accordance with the above Proclamation by the Governor, notice is hereby given that an election will be held at the voting precincts prescribed by law in Kershaw County on Tuesday, April 2nd, 1907, for Judge of Probate, to serve the remainder of the term for which the late J. B. Phelps was elected.
 Before the hour fixed for opening the polls Managers and Clerks must take and subscribe the Constitutional oath. The Chairman of the Board of Managers can administer the oath to the other members and to the Clerk; a Notary Public must administer the oath to the Chairman. The managers elect their Chairman and Clerk.
 Polls at each voting place must be opened at 7 o'clock a. m. and closed at 4 o'clock p. m.
 The Managers have the power to fill a vacancy and if none of the Managers attend, the citizens can apply from among the qualified voters, the Managers who after being sworn, can conduct the election.
 At the close of the election, the Managers and Clerk must proceed publicly to open the ballot boxes and count the ballots therein, and continue out of adjournment until the same is completed, and make a statement of the result and sign the same. Within three days thereafter, the Chairman of the Board, or some one designated by the Board, must deliver to the Commissioners of Election the poll list, the boxes containing the ballots and written statements of the results of the election.
