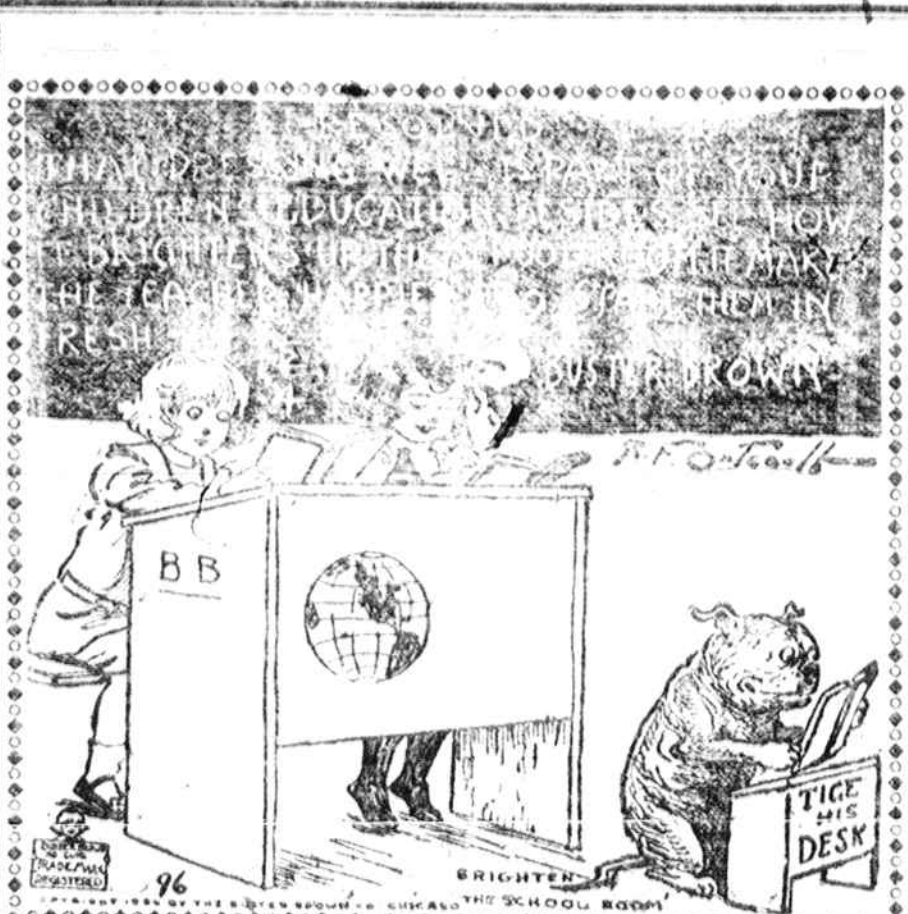
Lost.

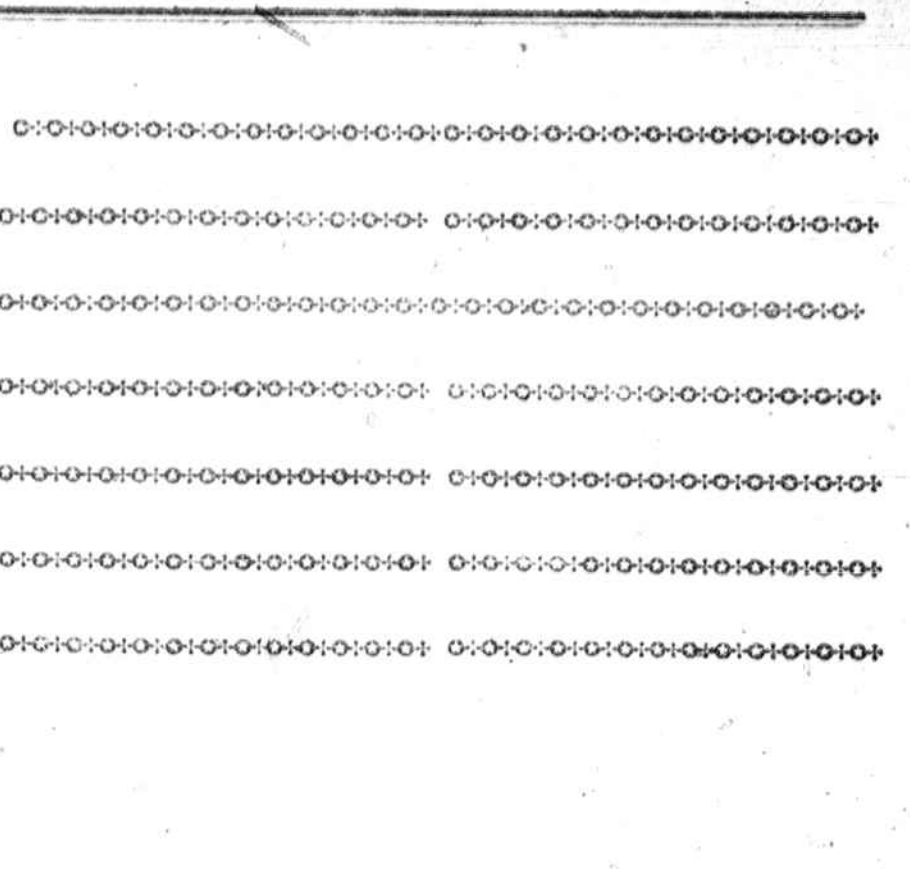
