Death of Rev. J. J. Workman.
Our community has been saddened by the death of Rev. J. J. Workman which occurred Tuesday, March 17th.
Mr. Workman was a member of the South Carolina Methodist Conference for forty-seven years and during thirty years of that time, before his physical infirmities compelled him to discontinue active work, he labored faithfully in the Master's cause on the various charges to which he was appointed.
As is always the case with a true minister of the gospel, Mr. Workman found it a great trial to give up the active ministry but for the last seventeen years of his life as a supernatural preacher he has not failed to let his light shine.
When it was announced that Mr. Workman was dead the universal remark was "He was well prepared to die." It is said that among educated people a man may be judged by the books he reads. With that as a criterion Mr. Workman ranks high. He read deeply and widely with the Holy Scriptures as the backbone of all his investigations.
His last appearance in Camden was at his familiar place at the Lytleton Street Methodist Church the 2nd Sunday morning in March. On returning to his home near Camden that afternoon he performed the last official act of his life which was that of the marriage service. Sunday night he was found to have a severe cold with fever, and his decline was steady and rapid, ending in his death nine days later. All that medical skill and loving care could do was done for him but God had called him home. How appropriate to him the lines repeated by a loved one at his dying bedside:
"What's this that steals upon my frame?
Is it death? Is it death?
If this be death I soon shall be
From sin and sorrow all set free,
I shall the King of glory see."

Mr. Workman was buried Wednesday afternoon in the Camden cemetery beside the grave of his only brother, and near that of his distinguished grand father, Rev. James Jenkins for whom he was named.
The sincere sympathy of the community is with the bereaved family.
