Camden last Monday morning with
Judge John S. Williams, of Man-
ning, presiding, and the following
cases have been disposed of:

Edgar Deas and Cap Drakeford
pleaded guilty of housebreaking
and larceny 2 years.

to the penitentiary for two years
for picking the pockets of an old

age, was connected with the same
crime and was sent to the State
Reformatory for one year.

battery, \$50 or three months.

We have passed on all bills pre-
sented by the Solicitor.

We have inspected the public of-
fices and find them clean and well
kept.

Public Buildings.
The Court House is in good con-
dition with the exception of the lower
passage in front part of the
building which should be drained of
a certain amount of water standing,
which has filtered through the walls,
there is a drain for it but it seems to
have become stopped. With regard
to the heating apparatus it appears to
be that with an extension of the
pipes through the building, the
boiler, now unused
could heat the building at a
much less cost than that of the fuel
now used in the open air place.
This item we recommend to the
attention of the Board of Commis-
sioners. We are pleased to note that
the grounds around the Court House
are at last being attended to.

The Jail we find in first-class shape,
clean and well kept, and prisoners
in good condition.

The Dispensary, both store and
bottling plant, are clean and well
kept.

With regard to the Poor House,
we find the buildings have been re-
paired and ceiled, and improvements
recommended by the last grand jury
have been carried out. The inmates
are comfortable and satisfied,
and everything connected with the
institution is in exceedingly satisfac-
tory condition. At present there
are four inmates.

Bonds
We have inspected the bonds of
all of the County Officers and find
them perfectly satisfactory, six being
surety bonds and three personal.

Roads and Bridges
The roads and bridges are in good
shape with the exception of a few
places which the Supervisor has un-
der immediate consideration.

Books
With regard to the books a com-
mittee has been appointed which will
make a complete inspection and re-
port at our next meeting.

General
We note with regret this is the
last term in which our Solicitor the
Hon. Geo. B. Timmerman will be
with us. We desire to wish him
every and continued success in what-
ever field his labor may call him-
self to. We thank your Honor and the of-
ficials for your courtesy and consid-
eration.

An Ordinance.

To Regulate the Stringing of
Telegraph, Telephone and
Electric Light Wires:

Be it ordained by the City Council of
the City of Camden, S. C., that from and
after the passage of this Ordinance all
Telegraph, Telephone and Electric Light
Wires, used in the City of Camden, S. C.,
shall be strung or attached to poles at a
height of not less than 25 feet on Broad
Street, between DeKalb and York, and
25 feet on other Streets, above the level
of the street, and shall be securely at-
tached to said poles and shall be properly
insulated and otherwise made safe, and
that no person or corporation shall be
guilty of a misdemeanor and upon con-
viction thereof shall be fined (1) \$100 or
be imprisoned for a period not exceeding
thirty (30) days in the discretion of the
City Recorder.

An Ordinance.

To Prevent the Obstruction of
the Streets of the City of
Camden, S. C., by Tele-
graph, Telephone, Electric
Light and other Poles:

Be it ordained by the City Council of
the City of Camden, S. C., that from
and after the passage of this Ordinance it
shall be unlawful for any person or cor-
poration to erect or place any Telegraph,
Telephone or Electric Light poles, or other
obstruction, in or on the drive-
ways or sidewalks or drains of the
streets of the City of Camden;
and any such obstruction now stand-
ing or being in or on said drive-ways, side-
walks or drains are hereby declared to be
a nuisance and an obstruction to the
Streets and shall be removed by said
person or corporation within nine days
after written notice from the Mayor or
Chairman of the Committee on Streets
of the City of Camden; that any Tele-
graph, Telephone or Electric Light poles
erected in the City of Camden shall be
placed on a line between the outer edge
of the sidewalk and the inner edge of
the street drain, and under the direction
of the City Council of Camden or its duly
appointed representative; that any per-
son violating the terms of this Ordinance
shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and
upon conviction thereof shall be fined
in a sum not exceeding one hundred dol-
lars (\$100.00) or be imprisoned for a pe-
riod not exceeding thirty (30) days in
the discretion of the City Recorder.

Seaboard Mileage.

The Seaboard Air Line will place in effect the following arrangements relative to the mileage tickets, effective April 1st, 1908.

Will sell at \$20.00 one thousand mile interchangeable ticket, good for one person; and for \$40.00 two thousand mile interchangeable tickets, issued in name of five or less persons, members or employees of one firm, good for only one person at a time (good over approximately thirty different roads).

The present popular one thousand mile interchangeable ticket good over more than seventy different roads, will be continued on sale at rate of \$25.00 as heretofore.

IMPORTANT NOTICE:—Mileage tickets sold on April 1st and thereafter must be exchanged at ticket offices for regular tickets, as coupons of mileage tickets will not be honored on trains, except from stations where there is no agent or where the ticket office is not open.

Local intra-state family mileage tickets, good for 500 miles within the State issued, good for the entire family, will be sold at rate of \$11.25. (2 1-4c per mile) These family tickets will be honored on trains. They will not be sold good in Florida.

The two cent mileage tickets will not be good in Florida excepting between Evergreen, Fernandina and Jacksonville. Between Savannah and Jacksonville 172 coupons will be detached. Between intermediate stations between Savannah and Jacksonville sufficient coupons will be detached to make net rate equal 2 1-2c per mile.

Between Savannah and Montgomery, 412 coupons will be detached. Between intermediate stations between Savannah and Montgomery including Ocala, Columbus and Albany branches, sufficient coupons will be detached to make net rate equal 2 1-3c per mile.

Final Session of the Sewerage Commission.

Messrs Garrison and Goodale Highly Complimented.

At the conclusion of business at the final session of the sewerage commission last Monday evening Capt. W. M. Shannon, attorney for the Commission requested the privilege of introducing in behalf of the Commission the following resolutions:

1. Resolved that the thanks of this Commission is due and is hereby tendered to Chairman H. G. Carrison for his intelligent, judicious and economical management of the Sewerage Contract of the City of Camden and the very satisfactory manner in which he arranged the finances of this Commission to prosecute its work.

2. Resolved that the thanks of the Commission is due to Mr. J. J. Goodale, its Secretary, for the faithful and satisfactory manner in which he has performed his duties with this Commission.

These resolutions were heartily seconded by Messrs. Kennedy, Zemp and Wolfe and Dr. Corbett.

In offering these resolutions Capt. Shannon took occasion to say that he had for many years been in position to observe the prosecution of public work of various kinds and that he had never known or worked with a body of men who were more loyal to an undertaking than this Commission had been. He knew that every care had been taken to secure a complete sewerage system for the city of Camden at a most reasonable cost. It is a matter of great satisfaction to us all, who have worked together, to emphasize and to record the fact that the Chairman of this Commission by his persistent efforts saved several thousand dollars on this work even after the contract had been practically awarded. It is a matter of congratulation to the city of Camden that it had so strong a commission in charge of this work.
