ORDINANCE.

To Raise Supplies For The Fiscal Year Ending April 30th, 1910.

(Special License)

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Aldermen of the city of Camden, S. C., and by the authority of the same:

Sec. 1. That this special license ordinance adopted by the city council, on the 6th day of April, 1909, for the present fiscal year, and passed and ordained as a special ordinance to raise supplies for the fiscal year ending April 30th, 1910.

That every person, firm or corporation, engaged or intending to engage in any trade, business or profession hereinafter mentioned, within the limits of the city of Camden, shall first obtain a license from the Clerk and Treasurer, and all licenses herein mentioned shall be non-transferable and for the fiscal year, if not otherwise specially provided. And all annual licenses shall expire on April 30th, 1910, but may be revoked at any time by the Mayor or city Council.

Sec. 2. All licenses for the year granted under this Ordinance, shall continue in force until the 30th day of April next succeeding the date of issue, and no license, except as provided for by limitation, per diem or month, shall be issued for less time or rate than for one year. The city Clerk and Treasurer shall prepare a proper form to be issued in each case.

Sec. 3. Applications for licenses of all kinds shall be made to the city Clerk and Treasurer, and all fees for same shall be paid to him in advance.

Sec. 4. No person, firm or corporation shall be engaged in, prosecute or carry on any business, occupation or profession, hereinafter mentioned, without first receiving from the Clerk and Treasurer of the city, a special license therefor. Any person or persons, corporations or associations failing to secure such license shall on conviction be fined not less than \$25, nor more than \$100, or one hundred dollars or imprisonment not more than 30 days in the discretion of the Recorder.

Sec. 5. For a license to carry on any trade, business or profession hereinafter mentioned, the following sums shall be paid to the city Treasurer:

Sec. 6. The amount to be charged license for any other business, trade, profession or occupation, not herein specifically enumerated, shall be fixed by the Mayor and Clerk conjointly, but the said Mayor and Clerk shall have no authority to change or reduce the license fees herein fixed: Provided, that in case of short terms licenses taken out in the latter part of the fiscal year, the Mayor and Clerk may in their discretion reduce the license fee.

Sec. 7. That all ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith, be and the same are hereby repealed, Done and ratified in City Council at Camden, South Carolina, this 5th day of April, A. D., 1909, and in the one hundred and thirty-third year of American Independence.

CITY TAXES.

An Ordinance To Raise Supplies For The Year of Our Lord, 1909.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Aldermen of the city of Camden, S. C., and by the authority of the same, that the following taxes be and the same are hereby levied for the current year—from the 1st day of January 1909, to the 31st day of December, 1909.

Sec. 1. That all able bodied male persons between the ages of eighteen and fifty years, residing within the corporate limits of the city of Camden, S. C., not exempt from road duty under the laws of the State, shall work the streets, ways and bridges under the direction of such overseers as may be appointed for such a space of time not exceeding six (6) days in one year. Provided: That at the time of receiving the notice any person may pay to the person giving such notice three dollars (\$3.00) commutation, which shall be received in lieu of the work, and that any person refusing to work and streets or to pay said commutation shall be fined not less than five (\$5.00) dollars nor more than ten (\$10.00) dollars or be imprisoned not less than ten (10) days nor more than twenty (20) days, in the discretion of the city Recorder.

Ratified by the Mayor and Aldermen of the city of Camden, S. C., in Council assembled, this 6th day of April, A. D., 1909.
