On last Friday afternoon the football team of the Camden high school and that of the University school of Columbia played an exciting game at the ball park. Score 0 to 0.

The two teams weighed about the same and very evenly matched except that the Columbia bunch had more practice and experience in defensive foot ball. Their ends and half-backs were particularly fine in this department of the game, breaking up Camden's interference on the round end plays and on boys could not gain at all around either end of Columbia's line. In line bucking however Camden gained on every trial, but to gain ten yards in 3 downs, as a team has to do now by the new rules, is very difficult on line bucks, so we of ten lost the ball on downs. Will Johnson, Camden's left tackle, was the star for Camden, as his gains through Columbia's line were beautiful to see. For Columbia Swygert played the best ball, his tackling being sure and sensational at all times. He also had a little the best of it in punting.

Earnest Zemp's work for Camden in receiving the forward pass was great. Dodge at right half also played a fine game. With plenty of training Camden has a team this year that will make it very interesting for any foot ball segregation of near the same weight. All of the boys play steady, gritty, clean foot ball, and all they need is training and speed.

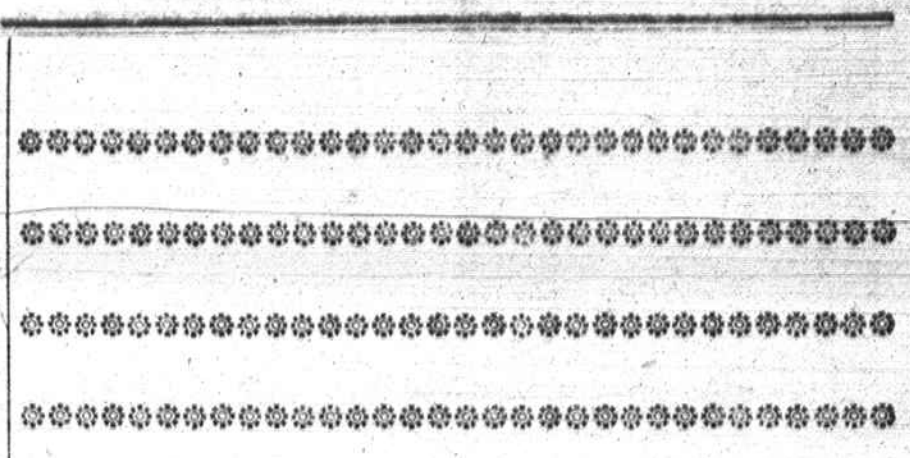
