IMPORTANT NOTICE.
To the Household and Citizens of the City of Camden:
In order to prevent sickness of all kinds, the Camden City Board of Health urges that all premises and vacant lots be kept clean and free of water, rotting vegetable matter and other mediums for the propagation of insects, these being the great cause of disease. Piles, gnats and mosquitoes require damp, garbage and warmth for their "living and increase."
Cut down and haul off all weeds, grass and underbrush.
Remove all cans or other receptacles of water, and fill all depressions in soil that retain water or moisture.
See that all surface drains are freely open.
Screen your houses, particularly dining room, kitchen and bedrooms.
Remove or screen all manure heaps, and keep all horse and cow stalls dry and clean. Clean daily and use lime or kerosene oil, or both freely and often.
Hogs should not under any circumstances or conditions be kept in the corporate limits.
FRIVIES.—Cut away all vines, bushes and weeds. Let in the sunlight. Keep doors and windows shut tight, and screen all ventilators. Use unslacked lime and kerosene freely and often.
See that your neighbor's premises are clean also, as dangerous insects will not always stay at home.
With the large area to cover and the small means at our disposal it is necessary for the individual citizens to help.
Be ready for the Inspector to find a clean town. Any member or officer of Board, or any family physician, will be glad to advise as to details.
The city water is not the cause of sickness, and citizens are warned against wells that may be bad.
