We are glad to learn from Mr.  
M. G. Carrison, Jr., the excellent  
Secretary of the County Fair As-  
sociation, that the exhibits for the  
Fair are coming in right along.  
This is right. Let the good work  
go on, and let's have a Fair that  
we will all be proud of.

The Lancaster News offers the  
following solution of the bagging or  
tare question: Make your sales  
weigh only 350 pounds and you get  
all the tare to which you are entitled,  
namely, 6 per cent.; for 6 per cent  
of 350 lbs. is 21 lbs. Six yards of  
bagging weigh 12 lbs. and the ties  
weigh 9 lbs making 21 lbs.

Lugoff Route No. 1.  
Editor Camden Chronicle:—  
"Large streams from little fountains  
flow,  
Tall oaks from little acorns grow."

And so it is. Route No. 1, Lugoff  
S. C. began operation Sept. 1, 1902  
Since that time I have made 2456  
rounds, have traveled 61400 miles,  
have handled 500,000 pieces of mail  
have brought in 3325 money order  
applications and \$64,000, made a  
mistake of 25 cents in the count and  
paid it, only 25 cents in all of the  
64,000 dollars.

I have owned 14 horses, 6 buggies,  
2 carts, 2 overcoats and 1 suit of  
clothes. If "Uncle Sam" don't  
raise my wages or lower the  
price of horses and horse feed, he  
will have a chance to "pack" the  
mail around with his own legs,  
for I will quit. We carriers are not  
getting enough. I got about \$32.  
per month after all route expenses  
are paid. I could not say "goodby"  
to some of my friends without shed-  
ding tears, and crying makes one's  
face ugly, so I am hoping and think-  
ing too, that "Uncle Sam" will give  
me a raise of about three hun-  
dred dollars. I serve some of the  
best people in South Carolina, some  
are not. I am quite sure that I am  
serving some of the kindest white  
and colored people in this county.  
There is not a better class of negroes  
in the state than live on route 1, Lu-  
goff, S. C. Many of them are fairly  
well educated and in good circum-  
stances. I have no truer friend than  
some of the negroes on my route. I  
will give you the names of a few of  
the best: Jan. Griffin, J. H. Harrell,  
Jury Wood, R. L. Harris and wife  
Laura—the best colored woman in  
the south, W. S. Wood, Tius Wil-  
hams, Ben Gettys, Robt Danham  
Sr., Ruben Wood and many others  
that are real good people and are  
as good and true friends as I have.

I have mentioned the butter milk  
so often, will just say now that it's  
measure is 16 barrels that I have  
hailed from Mrs. J. L. Gettys—don't  
cost one cent either. At least 5  
days out of the week I bring home  
fruit, vegetables, etc.  
"What makes the lamb love Mary?"  
Mary loves the lamb you know."  
Our post mistress is a nice little girl  
And treats us carriers real fine.  
Is making big money in a mercantile  
way,  
And is happy and contented in  
mind.

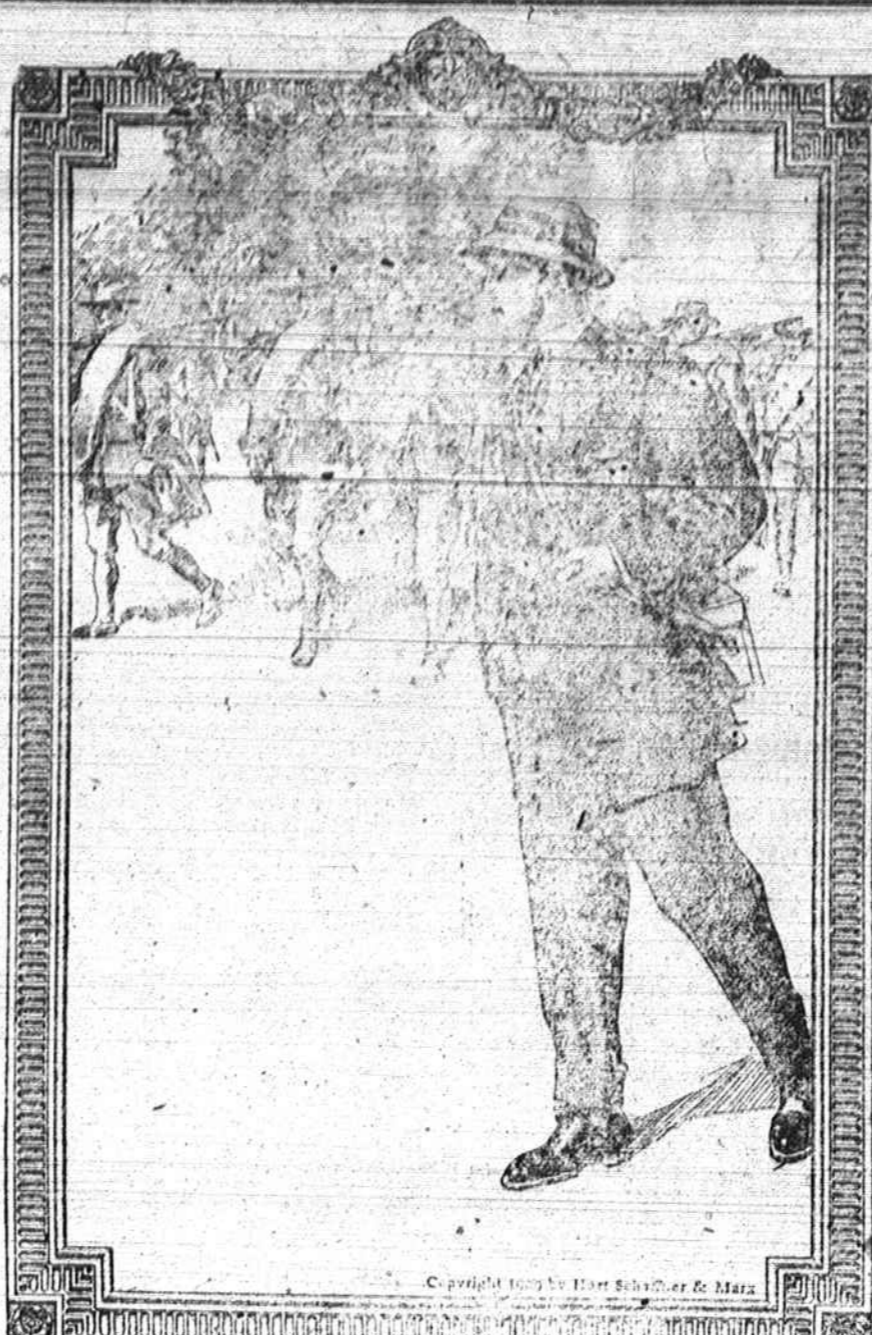
