

VITAL PALMETTO EVENTS

Condensed News Items of General Interest Gathered Within the State Boundary Lines.

WHEN ALL FLED.

Negro Boy's Announcement That He Has Small Pox Breaks up Court.

Either Ben Young, a 12-year-old negro boy is the brightest bigger in Spartanburg county or he is the possessor of the least sense. The chap was arrested on some minor charge and was brought to a little crowded court room where the preliminary hearing was to be held. It was noticed that he had something the matter with his skin and the dignified magistrate asked what the trouble was. He replied, "Boss, I've got getting over a little spell of smallpox."

The crowd of onlookers in the court room came near demolishing the building in their effort to get away from the negro.

Finally to relieve the situation one of the constables slipped up behind the door and commanded the negro to walk to the jail saying that he would follow with his gun drawn.

The negro calmly set the pace and single file about forty feet apart they proceeded through the court house yard.

In the meantime some one had put the jailer wise and he simply threw open the gates and fled to the jail ordering that the negro be left in the little inclosure which is surrounded by a high wall. This was done and the officials induced a physician to come and examine the negro. He bravely did so and on completing the job walked to the distant crowd of curious persons and said, "It's a bad case of seven year itch."

Paid \$1,000 Fine For Selling Booze.

In Superior Court held at Bennettsville, there were three cases charging violation of the dispensary law. Robert Bennett, a young negro, was given a sentence of \$300 or six months. James Woodley pleaded guilty and was fined \$100 or six months. J. Willie Jackson, a white man from near Paris's mill, on three indictments, pleaded guilty. Judge DeVore imposed a sentence of \$500 or six months in each case and suspended in the last case during good behavior. Jackson immediately paid the \$1,000 fine.

Feature of Aiken Fair.

Senator E. D. Smith of Florence has accepted an invitation to make an address at Aiken during the fair on Agricultural day, Nov. 3.

Among other speakers on the same day will be: E. J. Watson, Commissioner of agriculture; Prof. T. J. Jackson of the Cotton Seed Crushers' association; C. P. Haddon and Archibald Smith, both of Clemson college.

A highway expert will be sent to Aiken from the department of agriculture and will make an address on Good Roads day, Nov. 2nd. The South Carolina Good Roads and Drainage league will meet there that day.

News Notes.

A tract of 80 acres of land in Darlington county sold for \$4,500.

Gov. Ansel has ordered an election held November 22 to decide the question of annexing a portion of Oconee county to Anderson.

"Florence is going to break the world's record in the boy's corn contest this year if the indications materialize. Several boys are going to make over 200 bushels per acre under the government's direction.

Brutal Murderer to Hang.

Daniel Duncan, the negro charged with the murder of Max Lubelsky, white, was found guilty in the court of general session at Charleston and was sentenced to die on the gallows.

The murder was a particularly brutal one, occurring at midday in Lubelsky's store. A week later, while the police and detectives were at work on the case, Lubelsky's widow was assaulted with a club and Daniels is also charged with this crime.

Summary.

The first legal execution in Greenville in seven years occurred in the jail yard when the negro Bunk Sizerard paid the penalty with his life for having murdered Special Officer Waldrop at Piedmont two months ago.

Darlington has its water and lights furnished by a private corporation, and following months of inadequate service the citizens met and agreed not to settle outstanding bills presented by the company until conditions were satisfactorily improved.

Director T. R. Yarborough of the Lancaster Concert band has been awarded the contract by the State fair authorities to furnish the music for the coming State fair in Columbia.

The name of a new financial institution will be the Citizens' bank of Greenville. The proposed capital is \$33,000 making four banks for this prosperous town.

Fire Chief M. B. Saunders states that the firemen's tournament of the Greenwood county fair, which will be held this year, October 27, 28, will be a great feature.

At Spartanburg Judge Memminger held that where sign boards of warning on the railroad tracks were posted, a person so using the tracks is a trespasser, and that the railroad is not responsible for his death if killed while so trespassing.

Nannie Mobley of Chester, a colored woman gave birth to triplets, two girls and a boy.

The congregation of the First Baptist church of Belton, have let the contract for a handsome structure. Senator Smith thinks cotton is going to bring higher prices this year than at any time since the war.
