Where Is The Fountain?

The announcement was made several months ago that the United Daughters of the Confederacy of Camden and the City of Camden would jointly erect a drinking fountain in honor of Richard Kirkland at the intersection of Broad and DeKalb streets. We are not charging anyone with dereliction of duty, but we would like to ask why work has not been commenced upon the fountain?

[Since writing the above we learn that after it was decided to place the fountain, there was some objection by a member of council as to the location, and the matter is still being discussed. The fountain to be used was secured as a gift from a humane society through the efforts of Mr. R. M. Kennedy—the local chapter U. D. C. and the city only having to place the fountain. Mr. Kennedy we understand, favors the site above mentioned. In this he is eminently correct for there is no site so well suited for the fountain as the intersection of Broad and DeKalb streets. It is unfortunate that the objection should have been raised, and we trust the matter will be adjusted and work commenced on the fountain without further delay.—Ed. Chronicle.]
