The Baruch Memorial Hospital.

If Camden is to get the Baruch Memorial Hospital it will have to hustle. Columbia has gotten "real busy" in the matter and is leaving nothing undone in its efforts to obtain this Hospital. The Record in a recent issue said:

"Dr. Simeon Baruch is a distinguished physician of New York. He originally lived in Camden. He has a son who has made millions of dollars in Wall street. The son, so the report goes, let it be known while in Charleston that he desired to establish a free hospital to bear the name of his father. He first thought of Charleston as the place of location, but found that public charities there were so well taken care of that he turned his thoughts to other cities in the State. It is to get his attention on the advantages of Columbia, especially in the matter of central location, that the Chamber of Commerce, the Ministerial union and naturally the leading organization in such a movement, the local medical society, have begun a plan to obtain definite information upon which to further carry on the work to induce Dr. Baruch's son to look with favor on Columbia."

The central location can scarcely be used as an argument in favor of Columbia as Camden and Columbia both occupy almost the same geographical position, and as Columbia already has two splendidly equipped hospitals makes her about as well provided for in this respect as Charleston is. One of Camden's greatest needs today is a hospital as she has none of any kind, and if Dr. Baruch is looking for a location of greatest usefulness for his hospital, Camden with her central location and being without any hospital at all, is pre-eminently the place above all others in the state for the Baruch Memorial Hospital.

An Ordinance.

To raise supplies for the Year of our Lord, 1911.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Camden, S. C., and by the authority of the same, that the following taxes and the same are hereby levied for the current year from the first day of January, 1911 to the 31st day of December, 1911.

Sec. 1. A tax of 12 mills on each and every dollar of real and personal property within the corporate limits of the City of Camden, S. C. on the 1st day of January, 1911.

Sec. 2. That all alleys, roads, streets, bridges and other structures, the cost of which exceeds fifty-five dollars, and which are not exempt from road duty under the laws of the State, shall work the streets, bridges and bridges under the direction of such officers as may be appointed, for such a period of time not exceeding six (6) days in one year. Provided: that at the time of receiving the notice, any person may pay to the person giving such notice, the sum of \$25.00, commutation, which shall be received in full of the work, and that persons refusing to work on said streets or to pay said commutation, shall be fined not less than five (\$5.00) dollars nor more than ten (\$10.00) dollars, to be imprisoned not less than ten (10) days nor more than twenty (20) days, in the discretion of the City Recorder.

Sec. 3. The tax books for the collection of City taxes, will be opened in Council Chamber, Camden, S. C., on 22nd May and remain open each day except Sundays from 9 a. m. to 1 p. m. and from 4 p. m. to 8 p. m., until 22d of June inclusive, after which time the penalty will be attached to all delinquents.

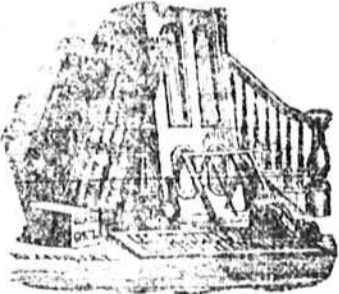
