## GIRLS' TOMATO CLUB.

We are glad to announce that the school girls of Kershaw County have kept up with the times and with the present-day spirit of advance in agriculture and material lines and have organized a Girls' Tomato Club.

The County Superintendent of Education got about forty girls to register as members of this club and by unusual effort succeeded in getting the Farm Demonstration Department of the United States Department of Agriculture to send a demonstration agent to this County to take charge of this work. This was quite a triumph, as many larger and stronger counties were unable to secure agents from the government for this purpose.

Miss Katherine Chappell, of Lykesland, Richland County, South Carolina, was sent as demonstration agent and has rendered most excellent service. The work was started too late in the year for best results, and weather conditions during the summer proved so unfavorable that somewhat more than half of the members became discouraged and gave up the effort to make a crop. Those who have continued to the end have done remarkably well under the circumstances. Some of them, in spite of the late start and the unfavorable weather, have attained really wonderful results. It has been decided to hold a Girls' Tomato Club exhibit in connection with the County Fair. These girls who have kept up the work as members of the club to the end will be admitted free to the entire Fair. They can get badges from Mr. McKenzie on the opening day of the Fair. All exhibits by members of the Girls' Tomato Club must be brought to the Fair Grounds on the day before the opening of the Fair.
