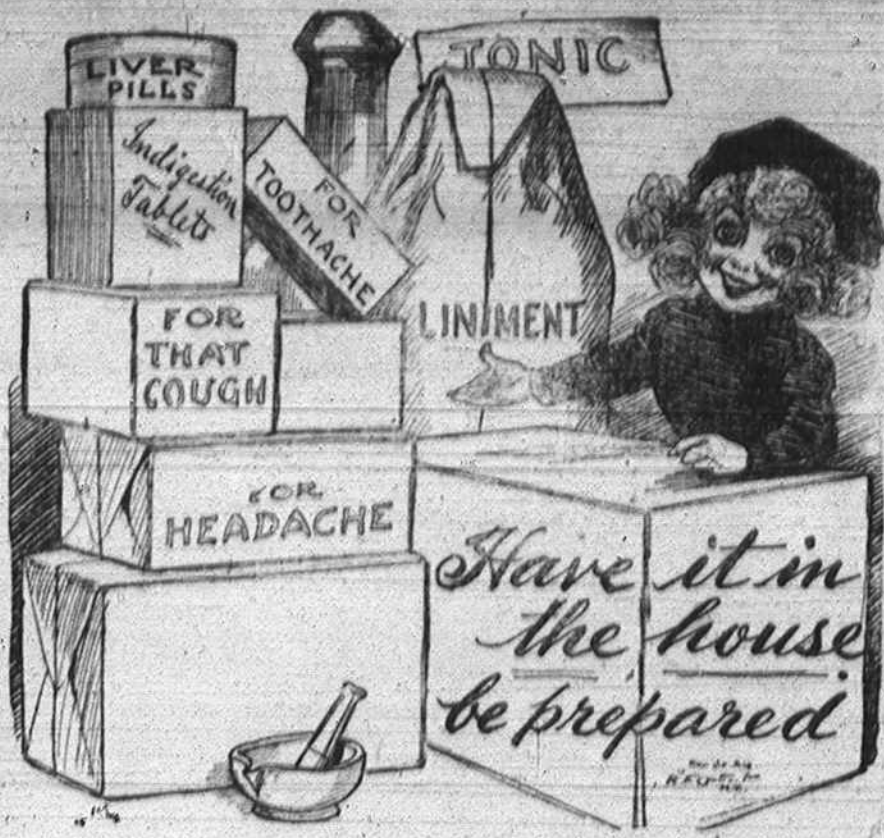

### Literary Club

The literary club which had such a successful season last year has resumed its meetings. They are fortunate to have secured again as leader, Mr. Richard Webb, of N. C. The first meeting was held on Monday evening with 15 members present. A most interesting programme was carried out. The club is taking up this year the study of Tennyson, one of the most popular of English poets, and one who should afford the club a most interesting subject by way of introduction to the 19th century poet.

Mr. Simpson read a paper on "Characteristics of 18th Century Poetry" in which he discussed the leading poets of the century. Mr. Webb also gave a resume of the period, discussing the movements which had their rise in the 18th century, and which in the late development had much to do with making the 19th century what it was. This was followed by a paper by Mr. Dawes, in which he gave an appreciation of Tennyson's works as a whole, and also a short sketch of the poet's life. Mr. Dawes also recited Tennyson's "Revenge." After some music, the meeting was adjourned until Friday evening.
