### GENERAL SESSIONS COURT

List of Cases Disposed of up to Yesterday Afternoon.

The November term of General Sessions court opened Monday morning with Judge Gage presiding. An unusually large crowd of country people are in attendance—many being attracted here by the two murder trials to take place at this term.

We give below a list of cases tried up to Thursday afternoon. The case of John Hough for the murder of his father-in-law, Mr. R. K. West, was set for yesterday. When the case was called for trial attorneys for Hough stated that the defendant was too ill to appear.

Judge Gage immediately appointed two physicians to make an examination of the defendant and report to the court this morning. Judge Gage overruled two motions by the defense to have the case continued.

The other murder trial to come up at this term, set for to-day, is that of Mr. Watson for the killing of Mr. Gregory near Kershaw.

The court yesterday afternoon was engaged in the case of H. Eichel, against S. P. Brasington, mayor. Mr. Eichel having indicted Dr. Brasington for assault and battery. The case grew out of the recent encounter in Hampton Park between Dr. Brasington and Mr. Eichel.

Dan Mitchell, colored, plead guilty to violating the dispensary law and paid a fine of \$100.

R. E. Bowers charged with obtaining goods under false pretense, plead his own case and was found guilty. The verdict of \$150 or 3 months was reduced by the judge to a fine of \$100, which it is supposed will be paid.

Aaron Boone and Fannie Barrett, charged with the shooting of Stewart Barrett, were found not guilty.

David Sutton, charged with the murder of Willie Young, at a negro frolic in the country, was found not guilty.

Garfield Adamson, colored, plead guilty to concealing himself in Mr. J. M. Carson's store at Kershaw, for the purpose of robbing it, and was sentenced to twenty months at hard labor.

Bob White, colored, plead guilty of shooting another negro on Mr. McCaskill's place a few miles south of Camden, and was sentenced to six years in the penitentiary.

Thos. Z. Boone was found guilty of shooting Henry Stevens, and paid a fine of \$150.

Louis Watkins, colored, charged with stealing a pistol from the house of Mr. T. A. Crossland, was found guilty, and given a sentence of nine months.

Dalton Missouri, colored, plead guilty of shooting another negro and was sentenced to nine months in the penitentiary.

S. D. Hurst, charged with trying to cut H. C. Player, was found not guilty.

Caesar Perkins was found guilty of grand larceny. Not yet sentenced.

Tony Campbell, colored, was found guilty of stealing \$40.00 from the pocket of Robt. Nelson. Sentence not passed.

#### Jury Presentments.

The following is the presentment of the grand jury handed in yesterday afternoon:

To his Honor, Judge Geo. W. Gage, presiding Judge at the Fall term of Court, 1912, Kershaw county: We the Grand Jury for Kershaw county S. C., beg to make the following presentments:

We have passed on all bills handed us by the Solicitor. The committee appointed to look after the public buildings, beg to report that all the buildings are in good shape, and are well kept. We beg to say that the buildings are as well kept as any public buildings could be well kept. They are a credit to the authorities.

The roads and bridges are in good shape and are a credit to our county.

We the committee appointed to examine the County books, beg to say that the Committee made a thorough examination and found the books in good shape as to neatness and they are kept in such condition that the financial condition of the county can be readily ascertained. We are proud to state that the county is in a state of good financial standing. At the end of the fiscal year there was a good substantial balance to the credit of each fund.

We beg to say that we have the books of the late Sheriff under investigation and will make a report on them at the next term of court.

We visited by committee the County Poor House, and beg to report that we found the inmates well cared for and everything seemed to be as well as we could find out, in

good shape.

In regard to the matter of paying witnesses for the State in which the Grand Jury found no bills, we respectfully report that after discussing and deliberating over the matter, we concluded and hereby request that all such witnesses should be paid, for the reason that the witnesses are forced to "come here by the State, and if they fail to appear they are then brought in to court with bench warrants. And in this connection we would respectfully suggest and urge that in the future, Magistrates use more care in the cases which they send up, and by so doing, a number of cases will be disposed of by them, and this court not put to the trouble and expense of handling them.

We desire to return our thanks to his Honor, the Presiding Judge, and other court officers for courtesies shown us, all of which we respectfully submit.

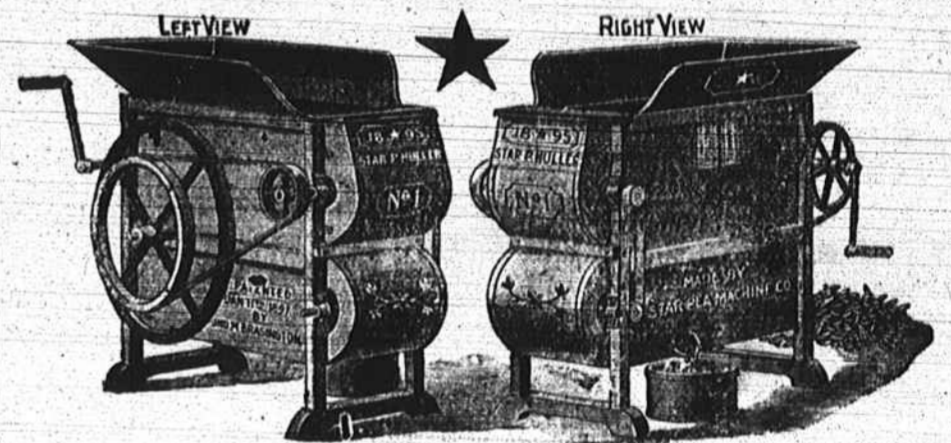
