

**MOTHER DePLANCK DEAD.**

**Notable Figure Had Been Visitor To Camden For Month.**

For several weeks Camden entertained a distinguished visitor unawares. Rev. Mother DePlanck was the guest of Miss D. E. Brown at "Villa Roseland" in this city for almost a month. A remarkable personality, her life was rich in good works, says one who knew her, and as the following from the Asheville Citizen, of Monday, Jan. 4, will show. Before she founded St. Genevieve College, in Asheville, Mother DePlanck had instituted three houses of education in England—one for daughters of officers of the army, one for daughters of the English nobility, and Hillside Convent under the Empress Eugenie's patronage:

"The Rev. Mother DePlanck, head of the Sisters of Christian Education in the United States, and mother superior of Saint Genevieve's college of this city, died at St. Agnes' hospital, Baltimore, early yesterday morning. The deceased had been taken to Baltimore for treatment following complications in the wake of a severe cold. By those who were close to Mother DePlanck it is known that the war in Europe weighed heavily on her mind because of the fact that she had brothers and nephews in the French army. She talked constantly about the war, and a prayer for peace was ever upon her lips.

"Suzanne Josephine Louise Deplanck was born at Lille in the north of France, May 21, 1857. She belonged to a wealthy and distinguished family and as a young girl evinced those qualities of personal charm, deep piety and rare intelligence which in later life developed into the splendid personality which drew so many friends around her in Asheville. When she declared her desire to become a sister of the Order of Christian Education her family urged her to reconsider, and expected a promise from her that she would wait four years before entering the convent. During these four years her family took the young girl traveling and surrounded her with every luxury which wealth could afford. But she never swayed from her purpose; she declared that she felt called to a life of service and sacrifice. She entered the novitiate in 1879 and took the final vows of the order August 24, 1881.

"In 1889, Mother Deplanck was made superior of the Hillside convent founded at Farnborough, England, and for eighteen years she gave to its development the strongest efforts of her life, succeeding in a marked degree, and making it one of the most important schools of the order, and one of the best known Catholic institutions of learning in England. At Farnborough, she became a close friend of the Empress Eugenie, enlisting the latter's interest to such an extent that the empress never failed to be the personal friend and patron of the convent and school. In 1905, Mother Deplanck visited America and again in 1906. It was in the latter year that she and the mother general, of Belgium, came to Asheville, and Mother Deplanck felt keenly the call of the mountains. In 1907 Mother Deplanck volunteered to lead a little band of sisters from Belgium to the United States. On January 6, 1908, she opened a little school on Starnes avenue, naming it Hillside convent, after the school at Farnborough. Under her management the school grew constantly, and in 1910 she purchased Victoria Inn and established Saint Genevieve's college, an institution which has become well and favorably known throughout the United States.

"Mother Deplanck had many traits of character which drew innumerable friends around her, the most noteworthy being her boundless charity and inexhaustible generosity. Unknown to the greater portion of Asheville's population, Mother Deplanck performed many good deeds among the poor of the city and this section. One of her last utterances was a request to the effect that no flowers be sent for her

Camden, S. C., Dec. 11, 1914. Notice is hereby given that the Auditor's office will be open for receiving tax returns from January 1, 1915, to February 20, 1915, inclusive. Those failing to make returns within said period, as required by law, will be subject to a penalty of 50 per cent, as I cannot take returns after the 20th, as the other business of this office must go on.

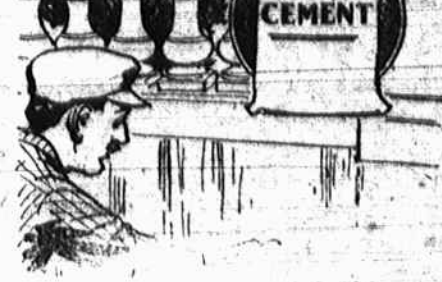
