Persons claiming disabilities must present certificates from two reputable citizens of this county.

A GROCER ADVERTISED.

Attributes All of His Success to Intelligent Use of Printer's Ink.

Duke C. Bowers, of Memphis, Tennessee, has 43 grocery stores in that town and sells nearly half of the groceries consumed there. Sixteen years ago he was piling staves in a Kentucky barrel factory at \$3 per day and while working at that job concluded to go in business for himself. A friend loaned him \$600 and he opened a cash grocery. His sales the first day amounted to just eight cents. Now he is rated in the millionaire class. Andrew L. Deming quotes Mr. Bowers in the St. Louis Republic as follows:

"If I had not discovered newspaper advertising, I would still be struggling for a living in that first store instead of having forty-three. A few months after I opened my cash grocery in Columbus, Ky., Charles N. Walker, who used to edit the paper there, showed me it would be to my advantage to take a half page ad every week, changing the ad every issue. Common sense told me there was no use running a business that would save the people unless you told them so, so I signed a six months contract. It pulled, so well in fact that I used to buy 200 extra copies and mail them out over Carlisle county to see if I couldn't get the farmers to come to Columbus to trade. Pretty soon I became the biggest advertiser that Walker had. Half pages became too small for me. I began to use pages. And business picked up accordingly. Seeing the success possible in a cash business pushed by good advertising, I sold out to go where I could get the greatest results for my efforts. Just before starting for Memphis an uncle of mine called me out for a private talk. 'Duke,' he said, 'you're not going to Memphis sure enough, are you?' 'That is what I am going to do,' I replied, 'I'm going down there and go into the grocery business right away.' He shook his head sorrowful-like and said, 'Duke, those newspapers will get all the money you have got. Charlie Walker has been making more out of your business than you have.' 'Well, the newspapers have gotten a lot out of me, but my greatest regret is that I didn't let them have more.' 'Then you believe in advertising?' Mr. Bowers was asked.

"I am not merely a believer in advertising," was the prompt rejoinder, "I am almost a fanatic on the subject. I firmly believe if I had only spent half so much for advertising as I have spent, I wouldn't be worth half so much as I am worth. Furthermore, I am convinced that if I had been foresighted enough to spend twice as much for advertising as I have spent, that I would be worth twice what I am worth."

Hard on Circuses.

The European war has cut off the main source upon which zoological parks and circuses depend for their supply of wild animals. The Hagenback brothers, the sons of Carl Hagenback, are penned up in Germany and are unable to send expeditions into the wilds or to ship animals abroad.

The Hagenbacks have had an animal trust which no one up to the present time has had sufficient experience or capital to break, but now London capitalists have formed a concern, the Wild Animal Supply company, which will attempt to take the world market from the Hagenbacks during the war.

Curator Hornaday at the Bronx Zoo has already received offers from the new concern to supply him with animals, but the Bronx Zoo is in good condition to run along two or three years yet without increasing its present supply.—New York Sun.

Mrs. M. E. Scott, a widow, 80 years old, living near Lowndesville, Abbeville county, was murdered in her home early Tuesday morning, and Charles Logan, a negro, has been arrested and is said to have confessed to the crime. He is now in the State penitentiary for safe keeping. Mrs. Scott lived with her 15-year-old daughter who managed to escape from the negro. The murder was committed with a hatchet. Mrs. Scott dying of her injuries Tuesday afternoon. Much feeling has been aroused over the killing. Governor Manning has announced his intention to call a special term of court for Abbeville next week to try the negro murderer.

Governor Manning Has Issued Proclamation for Week in April.

All over South Carolina between April 5 and 11 the cities and towns of the state will be engaged in a "clean-up" week, during which time it is hoped that the people will respond and see to it that their stores, vacant lots, residence lots and houses are cleaned up as they were never cleaned before. Governor Manning has issued the following proclamation in regard to the undertaking:

"Whereas the women of our land are striving in all ways to help toward better conditions; and

"Whereas, by careful attention and much hard work, they have awakened all of us to a knowledge of and a desire for vastly better conditions in our civic organization and the conditions under which we live, and

"Whereas, it has been proved beyond all doubt that clean private premises and clean public places greatly conduce to the general health, and

"Whereas, the women's clubs are planning a great 'clean-up' movement for the week, commencing April 5;

"Now, therefore, I, Richard I. Manning, governor, do name said week as 'clean-up' week and urge all authorities and all private citizens to give their time, attention and personal aid to this movement conducted by our women for our common good and benefit."

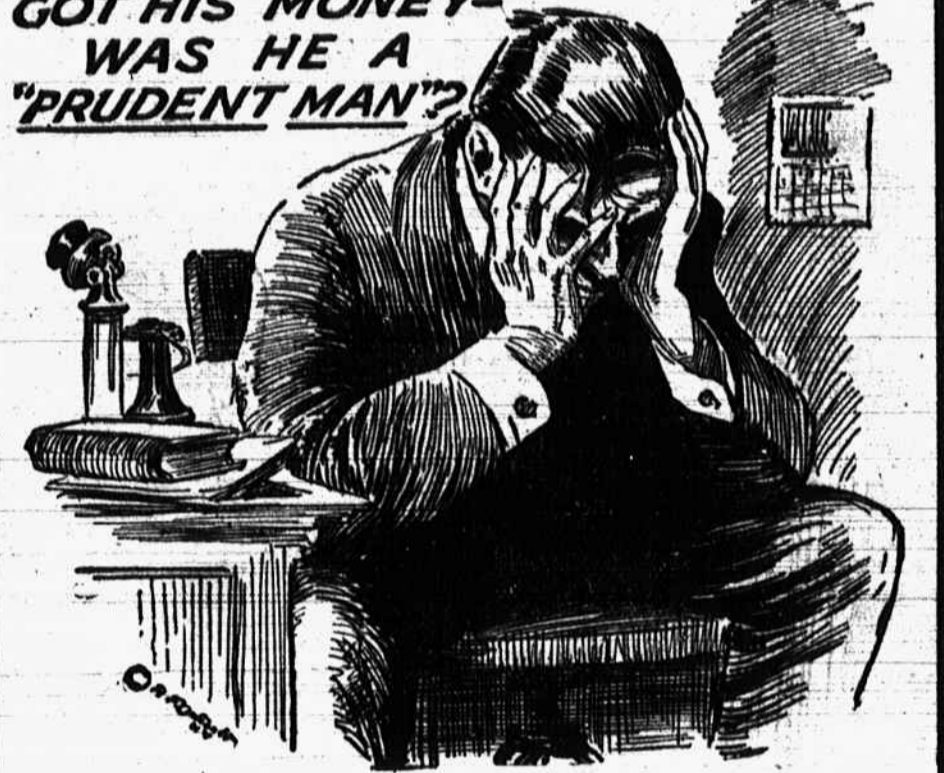
