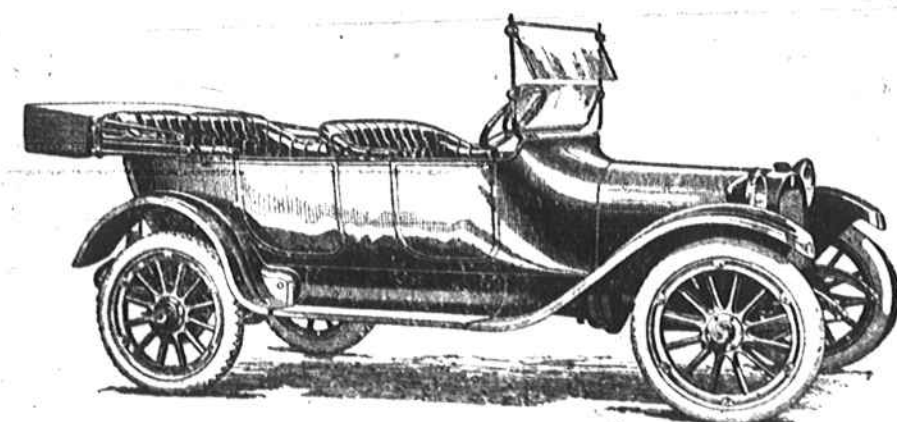

### BRYAN TELLS HIS REASONS.

He Insisted That Americans Be Warned Not to Sail on Foreign Boats.

Washington, June 9.—"Keep America out of war by removing the causes of international irritation."

This was the suggestion of Secretary of State Bryan to President Wilson immediately after the drowning of the *Thresher*, the American who lost his life on the *Falaba*, the boat which was torpedoed and sunk by a German submarine.

Secretary Bryan's proposals were: That the *Lusitania* matter be arbitrated and that all Americans be warned not to travel on foreign merchantmen of ships carrying munitions of war.

That the United States prohibit the carrying of munitions on vessels carrying passengers.

Mr. Bryan was unable to convince the President.

The Secretary believes now that he will be able to do work that will make for peace. He said that when he signed the first German note he believed he could convince the Cabinet on his views. He gave up hope just before resigning.

He said his position would be different from that of other Cabinet members as he would be responsible for the new note if he signed it.

Secretary Bryan received the newspaper men for the last time today. He paid farewell visits to officials and employees of the State Department and made a formal call at the White House.

Acting Secretary of State Lansing talked with President Wilson this morning, and with John Bassett Moore former counsellor of the State Department. It is understood that the latter resigned on account of differences with Mr. Bryan.

Among those mentioned for Secretary of State are Counsellor Lansing, John Bassett Moore and Secretary Lane. The President, who is the only one that knows, is silent.

The note will be sent to Germany this afternoon. It was signed by Mr. Lansing, as Secretary of State.

Howard A. Banks, private secretary of Secretary Daniels, denied positively the report that Mr. Daniels had resigned.

### RAISE INFERTILE EGGS.

Keep Male Bird Out of Flock After The Hatching Season.

It is conservatively estimated that there is an annual loss in eggs in this country of \$45,000,000. Practically all of this enormous loss is sustained by the farmers of this country, as it is on the general farms that the great bulk of eggs is produced. A very great part of this loss can be prevented by the production of infertile eggs, which are laid by hens that do not have a male bird with them. The male bird has no influence whatever on the number of eggs laid. Therefore as soon as the hatching season is over the male bird should be removed from the flock.

The greatest trouble from blood rings in eggs occurs in hot weather. Special care should be given to the gathering and storing of the eggs during the late spring and summer months. At these times the eggs should be gathered at least twice a day, placed in a room or cellar where the temperature does not rise above 70 degrees F., and marketed two or three times a week.

Blood rings are caused by the development of the embryo of a fertile egg and its subsequent death. It is impossible to hatch an infertile egg or cause a blood ring to form in one. It is generally considered that eggs become infertile from 7 to 14 days after the male bird is removed from the flock. Repeated experiments have shown that where fertile and infertile eggs are kept under similar conditions the fertile eggs spoil much quicker, due to the fact that they deteriorate faster than infertile eggs in the average summer temperature. Summer heat has the same effect as the hen or incubator on fertile eggs. Sell, kill, or confine the male bird as soon as the hatching season is over.

W. S. Glenn, president of the Security Trust company of Spartanburg, was fined \$100 by Special Judge C. M. Ehl in the court of common pleas for Spartanburg, Friday, for contempt of court. ### ONIONS WILL KEEP IF PROPERLY CURED.

Can be Successfully Stored If Care is Taken in Harvesting and Crating Them.

Clemson College, June 8.—Onions are very easily grown, but the amateur gardener usually finds difficulty in keeping the mature onions from July until-cold weather. Onions grown from sets never keep so well as those grown from seed, but when properly gathered, and cured, they can be kept satisfactorily. However, when they are stored in moist places or where the air circulation is poor they rot badly.

Onions should be harvested soon after the neck begins to shrivel and the top bends over and begins to turn yellow. They are pulled by hand, the tops wrung off in the field and the onions dropped into baskets. The old method was to throw three or four rows together and let them dry in the field for a few days and then remove the tops. The horticultural division of Clemson College advises that it is better to remove the tops immediately after gathering.

After the onions, with tops removed, are collected, they are placed in crates 3 feet wide and 4 feet long, with sides 4 inches high and ends 5 inches high. The bottoms, sides and ends of the crates are made of narrow strips about 1 1-2 inches wide, placed about 1 inch apart.

When the crates have been filled, they are stacked one upon the other in the shade under cover and there the onions are allowed to remain until danger of freezing comes with fall. Then they are placed in storage or sold.

The object of having the ends of crates an inch higher than the sides is to afford free passage of air when the crates are placed one upon the other. It leaves a good air space between the onions and the bottom of the crate above.

Prileau Richards, who is taking a law course at Carolina is home for the summer.

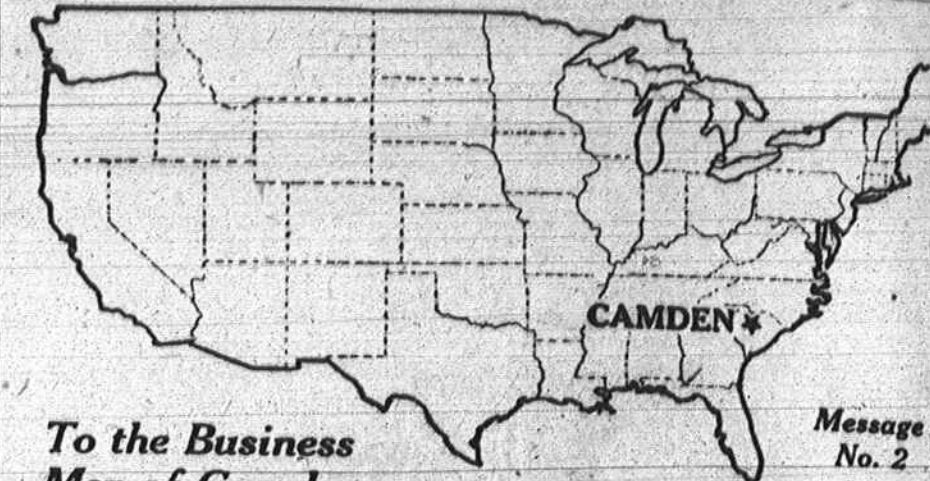
