LIBEL SUIT SETTLED.

J. H. Bulce and Ed. H. DeCamp Reach an Agreement.
Gaffney, S. C., Sept. 30.—The case of J. H. Bulce vs. Ed. H. DeCamp which has been pending in the courts for several months, and which excited a great deal of interest all over the state, was settled yesterday, and the case withdrawn by mutual consent. The suit was for alleged libel and damages were laid in the sum of \$20,000. The plaintiff based his suit for damages on a statement which was published in The Gaffney Ledger which he claimed was libelous.

Voice Heard Across Continent.
Washington, Sept. 30.—Navy department officials are enthusiastic over an experiment resulting for the first time in trans-continental wireless communication of the human voice. It was successfully transmitted yesterday from the Arlington wireless plant to Mare Island, California, naval station, a distance of twenty-five hundred miles. A conversation of several minutes was held in the overland wire from New York to Arlington and thence to Mare Island.
