**Miniature War Near Cassatt.**

On last Saturday morning the citizens of that peaceable section of the county about four miles east of Cas-

satt were stopped in the midst of their preparations for the days work by the sounds of what was at first thought to be a committee of citizens tendering a reception to a band of German soldiers. When the sounds had died and the smoke of battle had cleared away sufficiently for the neighbors to investigate it was found that a battle had been waged between members of the Bass and Gardner families of that section, with the assistance of a representative of the colored race named Dawson Furman. Those taking part in the affray were: Bud Bass, Lindsay Bass and Joe Bass on one side, and J. B. J. D. R. A. and Henry Gardner, and the negro, Dawson Furman on the other. Although it is said by some of the participants that about fifteen shots were fired and the trees bore evidence of a veritable fusillade, none of the combatants were seriously injured. Two of the Gardners were slightly wounded as were two of the Basses. One of the Basses was shot in three places in one of his legs, and on being questioned as to the extent of his injuries stated that the most painful one of his wounds was that one through his "ham-string."

Warrants were taken out for all of the parties and they have employed counsel and have given bond for their appearance at the next term of court.

Petitions for habeas corpus writs presented by Thomas E. Watson, of Thomson and C. E. McGregor, of Warrenton, former state senator, in behalf of two prisoners confined in the Richmond county jail in Augusta, on charges of having failed to register under the selective draft law, were denied at Mt. Airy, Ga., Friday by Judge Emory Speer of the United States court for the Southern district of Georgia. Judge Speer, however, ruled that the jailor and United States deputy marshal at Augusta appear there next Saturday and show cause why the writ should not be granted. He also directed a copy of the proceeding be served on the federal attorney for the Southern District. The petitions are based on allegations that the selective draft act is "unconstitutional and therefore void."

Fire, believed to have been of incendiary origin, destroyed the half million dollar plant of the Aetna Explosive company near Gary, Ind., Saturday. Two employees named Holt and Chosser were arrested. Their antecedents are being closely investigated. The plant was working on government contracts. It had an output of forty-six thousand pounds of gun cotton daily. It will take sixty days to replace it.

Former President William H. Taft who was attacked with intestinal troubles at Clay Denner, Kansas last week is now considered to be out of danger.
