ANOTHER PLOT MADE PUBLIC

Bernstorff Asked Berlin For Money To Influence Congress.

Washington, Sept. 21.—The American Government's publicity spotlight shining on the Berlin foreign intrigue turned today upon the expenditure of money by the Berlin foreign office in an effort to influence Congress on the eve of the ruthless submarine campaign which drove the United States to war.

Secretary Lansing made public with comment the text of a message sent by Count von Bernstorff to Berlin last January asking authority to be granted to influence Congress to pass an organization which the foreign office was reminded had performed similar services before. To supplement this move von Bernstorff suggested an official declaration in favor of Ireland and its effect here.

The organization to be employed was named. It was freely suggested by other officials, however, that it was one of the societies which flooded Congress with peace messages when President Wilson was asked that a state of war be recognized. This disclosure adds another chapter to the amazing story begun with publication of the famous Zimmermann note. It connects the German Government and Count von Bernstorff directly and conclusively with machinations which the American public had assumed was a part of the world-wide electronic intrigue, but which many people firmly believed were carried on or financed by German-Americans without actual authority from Berlin.

Little surprise was occasioned either in official circles or at the Capitol, although members of Congress were highly indignant. There was some talk at the Capitol of demanding an investigation and Senator Overman, chairman of the Senate lobby committee, and Representative Flood, chairman of the House foreign affairs committee, arranged to go to the State Department tomorrow and ask for more information.

On the floor of the House Representative Heflin, of Alabama, asserted that he could name thirteen or fourteen members of the two branches of Congress who had acted suspiciously and expressed the opinion that they should be investigated. Generally, however, the disposition was to regard as absurd any suggestion that any part of the \$50,000 sought by von Bernstorff was intended for members of Congress.

The von Bernstorff message, dated January 22, follows:

"I request authority to pay out up to \$50,000 (fifty thousand dollars, in order as on former occasions to influence Congress through the organization you know of, which can perhaps prevent war.

"I am beginning in the meantime to act accordingly.

"In the above circumstances a public official German declaration in favor of Ireland is highly desirable, in order to gain the support of Irish influence here."

Whether the State Department is in

possession of other evidence indicating the ambassador's activities has not been revealed, but the extraordinary disclosures has fixed the belief that the American Government has compiled the entire story of German duplicity and intrigue and that additional chapters will be added.

Governmental Ideas of Honor.

President Wilson on several occasions notably in his War Message of April 2 and in his reply to the peace note of the Pope, has called attention to the fact that no peace can be maintained with the Imperial German Government; that no autocratic government such as it can be trusted to keep faith; that only free people can hold their purpose and their honor steady to a common need, and prefer the interest of mankind to any narrow interest of their own.

The President was only restating a difference between two systems of governmental policy, two different governmental ideas of national honor, that has long existed. The quotations given below show the American idea of a nation's honor from the inception of this government down to the present day and the idea of national honor held by the German Government since the days of Frederick the Great.

"The foundations of our national policy will be laid in the pure and immutable principles of private morality. There exists in the course of nature an indissoluble union of virtue and happiness between duty and advantage, between honest policy and public felicity. The smiles of heaven can never be expected on a government that disregards the eternal rules of order and right, which heaven itself has ordained."—George Washington, President of the United States, April 1789.

"We are at the beginning of an age in which it will be insisted that the same standards of conduct and of responsibility for wrong done shall be observed among nations and their governments that are observed among the individual citizens of civilized states."—Woodrow Wilson, President of the United States, April 1917.

"We are now in a state of necessity and necessity knows no law. Our troops have occupied neutral Luxemburg and perhaps already have entered Belgium territory. This is a breach of international law. The wrong we hereby commit we will try to make good as soon as our military aims have been attained. He who is menaced as we are, and is fighting for his highest possession, can only consider how he is to hack his way through."—The German Chancellor Addressing the Reichstag, August 4, 1914.

The German Chancellor was simply following the keynote given by Frederick the Great speaking in 1740: "The question of right is an affair of ministers. Take what you can; you are never wrong unless you are obliged to give back."

Contrast the American and the German standards of national honor. The honor and good faith of the American Government from Washington's day to Wilson's are back of the Liberty Loan Bonds. Well may they be called the

TRICK OF THE CAMERA.

It Is Not Difficult to Make a Picture of Yourself as Twins.

In the Woman's Home Companion C. H. Claudy describes the photographic trick of having one person appear twice in the same picture and tells the amateur photographer how to accomplish it.

"What you actually do is this: Cut from a piece of thick, stiff pasteboard a piece which will fit into the inside of the camera and be held in place by the folds of the bellows. It should be fitted in the fold of the bellows which will hold it about an inch or an inch and a half in front of the plate. Its width should be half the plate opening and a trifle more—say one-eighth of an inch.

"Make this piece of cardboard thoroughly black on both sides by dipping it in ink and letting it dry. See that the cardboard is well 'seated' in the bellows folds so that light does not leak past the joints.

"Pose your subject and proceed to focus so that the image appears on the right side of the ground glass in the camera (left side of the finished picture will be the result). The left side of the ground glass appears blank, because it is kept from exposure by the cardboard. Insert the plate holder, take a picture, put back the slide and remove the plate holder; on no account move the camera, however. Very gently slide the cardboard from the left side to the right and replace the ground glass. Pose the subject on the opposite side of the center this time. Then replace the plate holder, remove the slide and make a second exposure exactly the same length as the first."

Why You Sleep Late Sunday.

"It isn't that most people don't have to go to work on Sunday that so many of them snooze the morning away," said a Brooklyn man who hasn't had to work for the past dozen years. "The fact is that there is a psychology to Sunday morning and its influence actually makes people snooty and disinclined to activity. This psychology is complex in its nature and involves pretty much the whole human system.

"First of all the person knowing that he does not have to turn out in the morning relaxes completely when he goes to bed and sleeps without nervous strain. Naturally he would get enough if he went to bed at a reasonable hour by the usual rising time, but instead of that he continues in a delightful doze. This is induced by the Sunday stillness. The usual disturbing morning sounds are absent and the consciousness is not aroused.

"The person isn't sleeping, he is merely unable to pull his energies together and wake up. He is auto-intoxicated, doped or anything you want to call it. His nerves are taking a much needed rest through mental or physical causes. That's plain enough, isn't it?"

Indians at Camp Jackson.

Columbia, S. C., Sept. 24.—A. H. McEachern and G. B. Sellers, members of Robeson county, N. C., local board No. 2 came to Columbia Saturday night bringing with them 14 Cherokee Indians from that county, who had been selected for service in the national army Camp Jackson. The Messrs. Sellers and McEachern said that they came along to explain the social status of the Indians to the officers at Camp Jackson.

The coming of the Indians, commonly called Croats, will give the camp authorities another problem to solve. The Croats associate on terms of equality with neither white people nor negroes and it is probable they will have to be located to themselves. In Robeson county they ride in the white railway coaches and stay in the white waiting rooms at the stations. This, however, is about the extent of their association with members of the white race, who neither eat nor sleep in the same places with the Cherokees.

Historic Kavala.

This Grecian Seaport Was Known as Neapolis in St. Paul's Time.

Kavala, the Grecian seaport which has figured so often in press dispatches during recent years, is noted as the birthplace of Mehmet Ali, the remarkable son of an Albanian farmer whose career as viceroy of Egypt during the first half of the nineteenth century almost precipitated Europe into a war of nations. The house in which this witty, wily pasha was born in 1769 is in a narrow, crooked street not far from the Turkish school which he founded, although he himself never learned to read or write.

In Roman days Kavala was known as Neapolis, and it was here that St. Paul landed on his way from Samothrace to Philippi, where there was a thriving colony of Christians, to whom the Epistle to the Philippians was addressed.

Prior to the beginning of the Christian era Neapolis was the seaport of Philippi, whose ruins are to be found some ten miles from shore on the highway from Kavala to Thessaly. Here the fleet of Irgutus and Cassius was at anchor during the famous conflict on the fields of Philippi in 42 B. C., when the assassins of Julius Caesar met defeat at the hands of the legions commanded by Antony and Octavius.

Practically all that remains to connect ancient Neapolis with modern Kavala is a Roman aqueduct, whose two tier arches still convey water from Mount Pangaeus to the town and citadel.

America's Object.

"The object of this war is to deliver the free peoples of the world from the menace and the actual power of a vast military establishment controlled by an irresponsible government which, having secretly planned to dominate the world, proceeded to carry the plan out without regard either to the sacred obligations of treaty or the long-established practices and long-cherished principles of international action and honor; which chose its own time for the war; delivered its blow fiercely and suddenly; stopped at no barrier either of law or of mercy; swept a whole continent within the tide of blood—not the blood of soldiers only, but the blood of innocent women and children also and of the helpless poor; and now stands balked but not defeated, the enemy of four-fifths of the world."—From President Wilson's reply to the Pope.

Big Cotton Mill Authorized.

The Monarch Mills of Union was commissioned Monday by W. Banks Dove secretary of state. The proposed capital stock is \$2,500,000, to be divided up into 25,000 shares of \$100 each. Of the total amount, preferred stock is to be represented by \$1,000,000 and common by \$1,500,000. Each class of stock is to have equal voting power. The petitioners are M. A. Moore and F. M. Farr of Union. A general cotton mill business is contemplated.

Dollar Gasoline in Cuba.

Havana, Sept. 18.—More than a thousand automobiles in Havana have been forced into retirement by the action of retail gasoline dealers in jumping the price from 47 cents a gallon to \$1, and in some instances to \$1.20 a gallon.

SPAN BOLTED IN PLACE

Links Arms of World's Largest Cantilever Bridge.

Quebec, Sept. 20.—The central span of the Quebec cantilever bridge was successfully bolted in place this afternoon at 3:28 o'clock, linking together the arms of the largest bridge of its kind in the world.

The hoisting operation began last Monday morning, and the span, which weighs 5,000 tons, was lifted by hydraulic jacks a distance of 150 feet from the pontoons on the St. Lawrence River.

Today's work brought to an end the critical part of the operation virtually completing the structural part of the bridge. An effort last year to raise a similar span in place resulted in disaster when the link slipped from its supports, causing fourteen deaths, and in 1907 a bridge in the same place collapsed when it was virtually complete, killing seventy.

The successful completion of the bridge will mean the fulfillment of a fifty-year engineering dream. It will be some months before trains can be run over the structure, as there is much detail work to be carried out. The running time between Halifax and Winnipeg then will be reduced half a day. One detail is the painting of the bridge, which, it is estimated, will take three years and cost \$25,000.

Plans are being made to clear vast tracts of land in the Straits Settlements for the production of bananas.

Our Sleep.

As a race we sleep too little. An infant's life is nearly all sleep. Gradually as the child grows older the hours of sleep are shortened. Youth till the age of twenty is reached requires fully ten hours' sleep. Although nature demands fewer hours' sleep in summer than in winter, it has been proved that eight hours of sleep are required for the average adult in good health. By this is meant not simply eight hours in bed, but that amount of good, sound, restful sleep night after night. Our power to work is intimately related to our ability to sleep, and there is no more reliable indication of sound health than the capacity to sleep naturally, and the more active and energetic the waking life the deeper the sleep.

Tripled Her Baking Capacity.

"One day, when baking cookies," says a housewife in the Woman's Home Companion, "I expressed a wish for larger pans. My husband said, 'Why not have some made to fit the oven?' He then measured the grate and went down to the hardware store. In a few days I had two Russia iron pans 19½ by 18½ inches and one inch deep. As these pans hold three dozens of cookies I can do my baking very much more quickly than I could with the old pans, which only held twelve cookies."
