U-Boat Toll Greater By Far Than That of Last Week.

London, Nov. 21. Seventeen British merchantmen were sunk by mines or submartnes last week, according to the weekly statement issued by the admiratty. Of these ten were vessels of two tons and over, and seven of less than 1,600 tons.

Last week's record of British merchantmen sunk greatly exceeds that of the previous week, when only one vessel of 1,600 tons or over and five craft of less tonnasse were sent to the bottom. In fact, it represents in the aggregate, the greatest number of vessels destroyed since the week of October 28, when 18 were lost. Since then there has been a gradual falling off in shipping losses until the minimum since Germany's intensfied subnurine campaign began, was reached November 11, with a total of six,
