Austria's grave food situation, coupled with the apparent failure of the new offensive against Italy is exciting pessimistic comment in the Vienna press. An official dispatch from Zurich quotes the Arbeiter Zeitung of Vienna as saying: "The situation will be still more serious in Vienna when the sanguinary defeat of the imperial forces on the Italian front becomes known."

The 100 Ford tractors which are to be furnished to South Carolina farmers at cost have been shipped from Detroit, Governor Manning said Wednesday.

Attack by Turkish troops on the American consulate at Tabriz, Persia, and the looting of an American missionary hospital in that city, reported to the State Department Tuesday, was believed in some quarters to presage the long-anticipated declaration of the existence of a state of war between the United States and the Ottoman Empire.

Men Called For Colleges.

The Provost Marshal General has sent out a call for 220 grammar school graduates to report to the South Carolina University on July 1st for instruction as auto mechanics, carpenters, concrete workers, electricians, radio operators and truck drivers. Of this number Kershaw County is called upon to furnish ten men.

The call also includes ten colored men, grammar school graduates from this county, to report to the South Carolina Colored Agricultural and Mechanical College on July 1st for instruction as auto mechanics, bench wood workers, blacksmiths, chaffers, concrete workers and tractor operators.

1. The Provost Marshal General announces the following induction calls for this State: "Call No. 735. Complete the entrainment for Columbia, South Carolina, of two hundred twenty-six grammar school graduates who have had some experience along mechanical lines and some aptitude for mechanical work, to report to Commanding Officer, South Carolina University on July 1st for instruction as auto mechanics, carpenters, concrete workers, electricians, radio operators and truck drivers. Only white men and men physically qualified for general military service are to be inducted under this call."

"Call No. 708. Complete the entrainment for Orangeburg, South Carolina, of two hundred forty-seven grammar school graduates who have had some experience along mechanical lines and some aptitude for mechanical work, to report to Commanding Officer, South Carolina Colored Agricultural and Mechanical College on July 1st for instruction as auto mechanics, bench workers, blacksmiths, chaffers, concrete workers and tractor operators. Only colored men and men physically qualified for general military service are to be inducted under this call."

"Men selected for this service will receive a course of training at Government expense fitting them to serve in Army positions both at the front and behind the lines. Men taking this course will receive thorough instruction which will be of great personal value in working their way ahead both in the Army and in civil life. The men will be assigned during the course to that kind of mechanical training for which greatest need exists at the time of the call. At the end of the course they will be assigned to various branches of the service in accordance with the needs of the Army. They are to receive no assurance of an assignment to any particular branch of the service. These are exceptional opportunities for energetic ambitious men. You are urged to make these calls of State wide interest. Qualified registrants should be urged to present themselves to their local Boards for voluntary induction. When registrant voluntarily present themselves, local boards may induct qualified men until their allotment has been filled. The voluntary period will continue until June 21st. After June 21st no more volunteers will be accepted. If, on June 21st, a sufficient number of volunteers has not come forth to fill the allotment of the local board, the local board will proceed to select in sequence of order numbers sufficient number of qualified men from within Class One to fill its allotment, deducting the voluntary inductions. Only men who have completed at least a grammar school education and have had some experience along mechanical lines and some aptitude for mechanical work should be inducted."

Each man must carry with him at least two suits of underclothing, one suit of outer clothing in good condition, a sweater, a stout pair of shoes, three extra pairs of socks, and two bath towels, as he will be kept in civilian clothing during the first three weeks until he can be supplied with a uniform and other clothing."
