AN ORDINANCE

Requiring all able-bodied male persons between the ages of 18 and 50 years inclusive to be regularly or continually engaged in some lawful, useful and recognized business, profession, occupation or employment during the present war in which the United States is now engaged and providing for labor identification cards.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Al dermen of the City of Camden, S. C., in Council assembled:

Section I. It is hereby declared to be the duty of every able-bodied male resident of the city of Camden, S. C., be tween the ages of 18 and 50 years inclusive, to be habitually and regularly engaged in some lawful, useful and rec ognized business, profession, occupation, trade or employment from the date of the passage of this ordinance, and thence forward until the termination of the present war in which the United States is engaged, and any able-bodied male resident of this city between the ages aforesaid, who shall refuse to be so employed for at least five (5) days, or fifty (50) hours per week, shall be deemed guilty. of an offense, and upon conviction there of shall be punished as bereinafter provided. In no case shall the possession by the accused of money, property or income sufficient to support himself, and those regularly dependent upon him, be a defense to any prosecution under this

And in no case shall the claim by the accused of his inability to obtain work or employment be a defense to a prosecution bereunder, provided however that this ordinance shall not apply to bona tide students during a school term. nor to persons fitting themselves to en gage in trade or industrial pursuits.

For the purpose of this ordinance, any male person as aforesaid found in this

the accused habitually lofters in idleness on the streets, alleys, roads, depots, pool rooms, hotels, stores or other places, shall be prima facia evidence of the failure or refusal of such person to comply with the provisions of this ordi-

Section II. That the said City of printed labor identification cards, which shall be furnished to employers or employees, when called for by them. imployees shall keep such cards on their person, and exhibit them at any time, to any policeman of said City, who may desire to inspect said cards. Any employee who shall forge the name of any employer on said identification card, shall upon conviction, be punished as hereinafter provided.

Section III. Any person or persons violating any of the provisions of this ordinance, or aiding or assisting in any such violation, shall upon conviction in the City Court, be punished by a fine of not, less than \$25.00, nor more than \$100.00, or by imprisonement for not less than 10 days, and for not more than 30 days for every such offense.

AN ORDINANCE

To Raise Supplies for the City of Camden, S. C., for the Year 1918,

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Al-dermen of the City of Camden, S. C. and by authority of the same, that the following taxes be, and the same are hereby levied for the current year from the 1st day of January 1918 to the 31st day of December, 1918.

Section 1. A tax of (18) mills on each and every dollar of real and personal property within the corporate limits of the City of Camden, S. C., from

the first day of January, 1918, Section 2. That all ablebodied male ersons between the ages of twenty one and 60 years, residing within the corporete limits of the City of Camden, S. C., not exempt from road duty under the laws of the State, shall work the streets, ways and bridges under the direction of such overseers as may be appointed for such space of time, not exceeding six (6) days in one year: Providing that at the time of receiving uch notice any person may pay to the person giving such notice Three (\$3.00) dollars Commutation, which shall be received in lieu of the work and that persons refusing to work on said streets or to pay said Commutation, shall be fined not less than Five (\$5.00) dollars nor more than Ten (\$10.00) dollars or be imprisoned not less than ten days nor more than twenty (20) days, in the discretion of the City Recorder.

Section 3. The tax books for the collection of city taxes will be open in Council Chamber Camden, S. C., on the sixteenth (16th) day of September 1918, and remain open each day, except Synday, from 9 a. m. to 1 p. m. and from 3 p. m. to 4:30 p. m. until he 15th, day of October, 1918, inclu-

Section 4. That when the taxes and assessments or any portion thereof charged against any property or party on the duplicate for the current fiscal year, shall not be paid on or before the sixteenth (16th) day of October, the City Clerk and Treasurer shall proceed to add a penalty of one per centum on said duplicate and the said Clerk and Treasurer shall collect same and

City, shall be deemed a resident, and if the said taxes and assessments and the accused habitually losters in idleness sixteenth (16th) day of November thereafter an additional penalty of one per centum shall be added by the City Clerk and Treasurer on the said duplicate and collected by the City Clerk and Treasurer: That if said taxes, penalties and assessments are not paid on or before the 1st day of December, next Camden, S. C., shall provide and have thereafter, an additional penalty of five per centum thereon shall be added by the city Clerk and Treasurer on said duplicate and collected by the City Clerk and Treasurer. And if said taxes, penalties and assessments are not paid on or before the 15th day of December, next thereafter the city Clerk and Treasurer shall issue his tax executions for all taxes, assessments and penalties against the property of the defaulting taxpayer

The Colored Americans.

In commuting the death sentences of 10 of 16 colored soldiers convicted in the courts-martial growing out of the Houston, Tex., riots some time over a year ago. President Wilson says:

"I desire the elemency here ordered to be a recognition of the splendid loyalty of the race to which these soldiers belong and an inspiration to the people of that race to further zeal and service to the country of which they are citizens, and for the liberties of which so many of them are now bravely bearing arms at the very front of great fields of battle."

It is believed that the action of the President, especially with his reason given for his elemency, will meet with the approval of the American people.

The colored Americans as a race have proved their loyalty as soldiers, as workers, and as citizens generally. There are no exact figures of the amount of Liberty Loan bonds and War Savings Stamps they have purchased, but enough is known to warrant the statement that according to their means and ability their financial support of the Government has been splendid. The Treasury Department has on more than one occasion referred to this fact. The President's above mentioned, it is believed and hoped, will bring a hearty response from the colored Americans in the Fourth

He was sentenced to serve a year and a day in the federal penitentiary at Atlanta. 
