**Hilarious France.**  
 That Hindenburg meant his vain boast of being in Paris on April 1, 1918, to be taken seriously, was a fact disclosed by the booty in gaudy uniforms and silver helmets that the Americans unearthed when they marched into Coblenz. The Kaiser had ordered an equipment for a victorious army of 40,000 men who were to make a glitteringly pompous entry into the French city under command of the kaiser himself. The order was null and the equipment stored at Coblenz where it would be convenient for distribution among the Army selected for the mighty honor.
