\$100,000 BAIL DEMANDED

Of Prisoners Charged With Selling Poison Liquor.

New York, Jan. 5.—Bail of \$100,000 each was demanded by United States Commissioner Reif Schneider today when John Romanelli, an undertaker; Samuel K. Saleeby, a druggist, and Edward G. Ware, Saleeby's brother-in-law, were arraigned before him on charges of selling alcohol in violation of the law. The trio are alleged by federal agents to have been responsible for the distribution in New York, New Jersey and New England of wood alcohol which later was colored and sold as whiskey, causing more than 100 deaths. It is understood that the men will be taken to Connecticut and tried on charges of manslaughter.

Dramatic scenes attended the arraignment. Mrs. Saleeby protested that her husband was innocent of the crime and fainted when bail was fixed at \$100,000. Mrs. Ware, mother of the defendant, also declared that her son was not implicated in the case and she had to be carried from the courtroom. Examination of the defendants was set for Wednesday.

MUST GET NEW PLATES

Auto Owners Throng Highway Office For Licenses.

Eight thousand five hundred automobile plates for 1920 have already been issued by the state highway department and many of the new plates are seen on the cars operating on the streets of Columbia, though there are probably more 1919 plates still being used than those of the new year.

The 1919 plates expired December 31, 1919, and the new ones are now, and have been on sale for several weeks. Auto owners were in line yesterday practically all day taking out new plates.—Columbia State, Jan. 3.

Lancaster Fire Truck.

The new fire truck purchased by the city some time ago has arrived and was unloaded Monday. The truck is the latest model Seagrave, equipped with a pump with a pressure of 400 pounds to the square inch, a 75-foot extension ladder, one thousand feet of new hose, two chemical fire extinguishers and all necessary tools, hose ladder, axes, crow bars, shovels, etc. The truck cost approximately nine thousand dollars and is built under the specifications of the Southeastern Underwriters Association and one of their representatives will be here next week to test out the machine before acceptance by the city. The truck will be in charge of Robt. S. Harper, Chief of the Fire Department, and will be handled by Hoyt Hunter. In a trial Tuesday afternoon, a stream of water higher than the city tank, which is higher than any building in the city, was thrown with a pressure of 100 pounds.—Lancaster News

The Country Printer.

The Springfield Herald has in Editor Moore and owner and publisher one who usually speaks his mind. This paper this week contains this paragraph:

"We have run across a proposition lately that for cheek has given us a jolt. The Herald is expected to boost schools, churches and other public institutions, yet when these same institutions have a little money to spend for stationery, or anything else, the managers seem to forget that we ever existed and they send this money to outside print shops. Consistency, thou art a jewel!"

This reads to us like a legitimate protest. There is too great a tendency in the country to take small job work from the home printer and give it to the larger shops in the faraway cities. This is an evil that is prevalent in all small communities. We have discussed the problem with many of our country newspaper friends and it is surprising the number of people who will deny their local printing office job work because they can save a few cents on a printing job. Often there are additional payments to be met, such as postage, or express charges, that make the out-of-town job really more expensive than it would be if given to the home printer, but these extra costs are not figured by the men with the contract.

The local printer is deserving of the support of the home people. Without him the community would be in a bad way.
