The Chamberlain hotel, famous sumper and winter resort erected by congressional permission on the government reservation at Fortress Monroe; and nationally known for years by reason of the prominent character of its clientile was totally destroyed by fire Sunday afternoon. The Chamberlain was valued at \$2,000,000 and there was \$350,000 insurguee. Several persons at the hotel are reported missing.


