Attorney General Palmer has declared himself as a democratic presidential candidate, leading the list of aspirations for the democratic nomination in formally coming out into the open. In a telegram to Hiram I. Gardner, secretary of the Georgia State democratic committee, Mr. Palmer declared that "if the democrats of Georgia see fit to select me as their choice, I shall receive the honor with deep appreciation, holding it to be highly important that an opportunity be given in the primary to directly pass upon the record made by the present administration." Mr. Palmer's announcement it was believed will open the way for other democrats to announce their candidacies. Although the republican campaign has been on for some time, Mr. Palmer is the first democrat to declare himself.

The senate on last Friday night concurred in a house resolution to give each member of the general assembly \$100 extra compensation, making the compensation for the session \$300 instead of \$200. The Chamberlain hotel, famous summer and winter resort erected by congressional permission on the government reservation at Fortress Monroe, and nationally known for years by reason of the prominent character of its clientele was totally destroyed by fire Sunday afternoon. The Chamberlain was valued at \$2,000,000 and there was \$350,000 insurance. Several persons at the hotel are reported missing.

The general appropriation bill for state purposes this year calls for approximately \$6,100,000. A levy of 12 1/2 mills will be required to raise this amount. The free conference committee from the two houses reached an agreement as to the amounts to be raised near midnight Saturday night, total reductions from the bill were about \$800,000. The house adopted the free conference report on the Baskin bill to abolish the state pension commission. As the bill becomes law it provides for the retention of chairman D. W. McLaughlin, this year and also allows the names of all veterans removed last year to go back on the rolls. It also provides that at the end of the year the entire pension business will be cleared through the office of the comptroller general. Should the chairman resign, become incapacitated or die during the year, the duties of the office would devolve upon the comptroller general. Mr. McLaughlin will be allowed \$2,000 for the work. The rolls will be made up by county authorities as was the custom until one year ago.

GENERAL NEWS NOTES.

W. J. Westerly, 74, for 50 years a deputy sheriff of Guilford county died suddenly last Saturday.

The American consulate at Zurich, Switzerland, was damaged by a bomb thrown by an anarchist last week.

Former Governor B. B. Comer of Alabama has been appointed to succeed the late Senator Bankhead in the United States senate.

A gale at Vincennes, Ind., carried a chicken-house 50 feet square a distance of 200 yards without damage beyond breaking three windows.

The official appraisal of the Theodore Roosevelt estate values it at \$720,721, of which the state of New York gets \$8,891 as inheritance tax.

Immigrants from the United States to Canada last year numbered more than 420,000 according to announcement in Ottawa, Canada last Saturday.

J. Scottowe Wannamaker, President of the American Cotton Association is now urging members of the association to hold their cotton for a minimum of fifty cents.

Secretary Baker has informed Senator Simmons that it is not the purpose of the war department to court martial the soldiers at Oteen, who reported to congressmen the conditions at the hospital at that place.

Mrs. Maude Fort, wife of Dr. Allen Fort who recently accepted the pastorate of the First Baptist Church of Columbia, died in Nashville, Tenn., last Sunday. She was a daughter of the late R. L. Hicks of Spartanburg.

Millford Hubbard and his brother-in-law Jerry Hubbard were killed and William Hubbard, brother of Millford was seriously wounded in a gun fight between the three last Friday at Pounce, Va., on the Kentucky-Virginia border.

William O. Reynolds, a salesman of Columbia, was seriously injured last Sunday morning when an automobile which he was driving turned turtle. Three other occupants of the car—a man and two women, escaped with slight bruises.

Population announcement for 1920 by the census bureau Saturday gave Charlotte, N. C. a population of 46,318, an increase of 12,394 or 36.2 per cent. over the census of 1910. It was announced that the population of Toledo was 243,199 an increase of 75,612 or 44.3 per cent over 1910.

The appointment of a committee of citizens of Georgia to determine a fair margin of profit on the output of the mills was announced in Atlanta, Ga., Saturday night. It is charged that some of the mills have been making profits in excess of what would be judged fair.

Members of the general assembly of Virginia on Saturday night refused to pass their salaries, the house by a vote of 28 to 23 declining to take up any of its other and advance to final reading a bill providing for a 100 per cent increase. Members of the assembly now receive \$500 a session and the speaker of the house and president of the senate \$750.

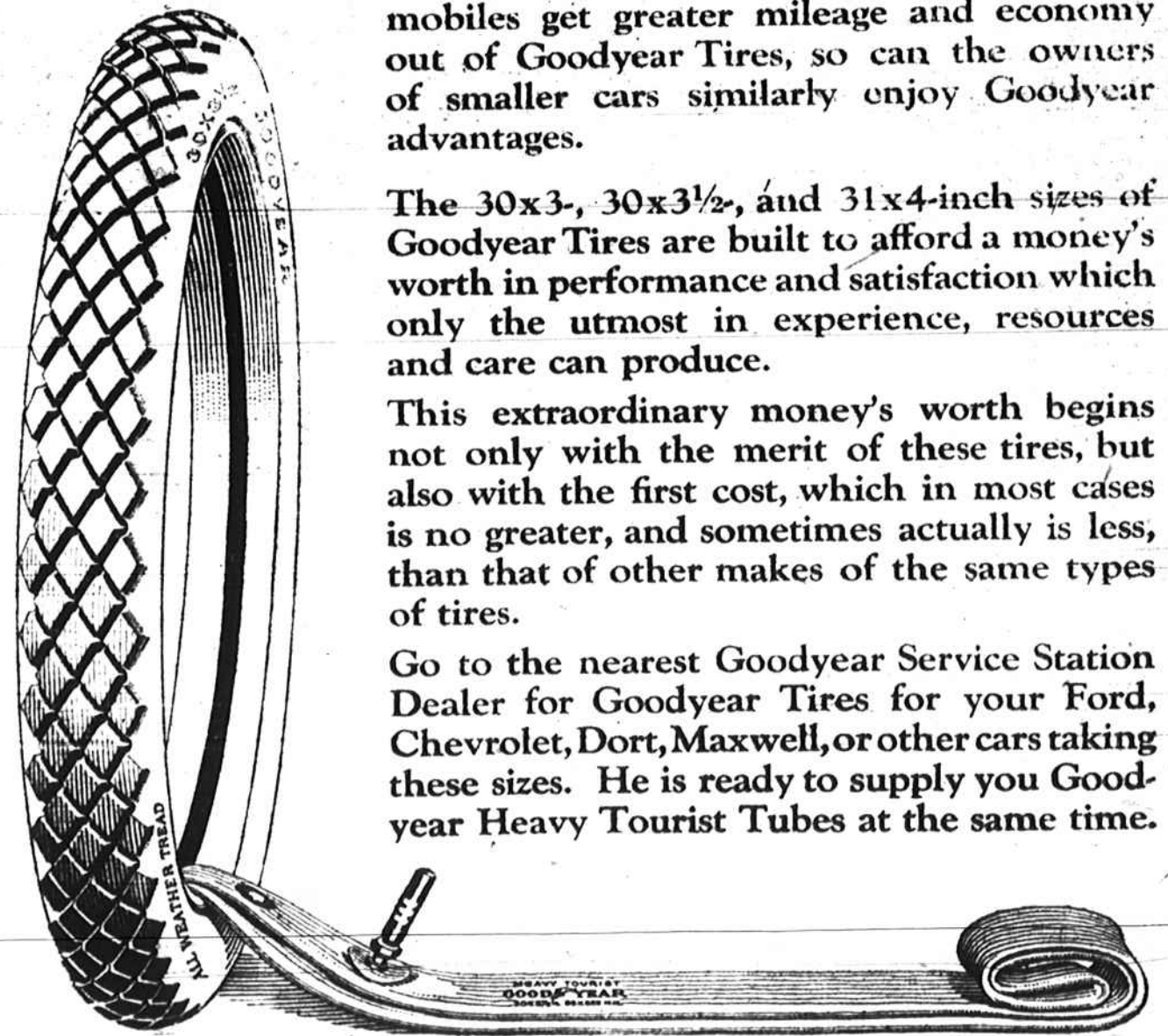
