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Washington, May 22.—Venustiano Carranza has joined the long line of Latin-American dictators who have ended their stormy careers in flight and death.

A fugitive in the mountains of Puebla, the old man who kept the United States and Mexico in a broil for the last five years, was killed on Thursday by some of the troops which had protected him as a loyal body guard in his flight from the Mexican capital.

Whether he fell fighting, or a victim of the celebrated "ley fuga," which made dead men of Madero and Suarez (or actually was murdered in a coup d'etat), is obscured in such fragmentary information as has come out of the tropical fastness of Tlaxcalatonga, where he died presumably surrounded by a few loyal friends.

Early dispatches today from Mexico City said the former president had been killed in an attack led by General Herera, who had gone with Carranza in flight, but later deserted to the revolutionaries. The announcement, made at the headquarters of General Obregon, head of the revolutionary movement, gave the impression that Carranza had died in battle.

But later advices received in El Paso charged that Carranza had been made a prisoner and assassinated in a cowardly manner," and said some of his friends who were with him at the time had sent a protest to General Pablo Gonzalez.

The full story may not be immediately known and even then may be the subject of dispute. In any event it adds one more drop to the river of blood which has flowed over Mexico since Porfirio Diaz signed his abdication in tears and died a heartbroken man in Spain.

But it does bring to mind a prophecy

said to have been made by a nun,

which is now being talked about all over Mexico.

The nun prophesied, according to reports, that after Mexico had seen three Franciscos in public life, she would have for president an old man with a beard, who would meet a violent death, and that he would be succeeded by a president who mounted his horse from the "wrong side." The prophecy also added that thereafter Mexico would lose its independence.

There have been three Franciscos in Mexico's public life since the prophecy was made. They were Francisco I. Madero, the murdered president of 1913, and Francisco Villa, the bandit leader. Carranza was well known for his whiskers; Obregon, who led the revolt against him and is expected by many to succeed to the head of the government, lost an arm in the battle of Celaya, with Villa, and mounts his horse from the "wrong side."

Carranza's death and the manner of it, probably will have some important bearing on the action of the United States when the time comes to consider recognition of the government which succeeds him. When President Wilson was refusing to recognize Huerta, he based his action on the untimely deaths of Madero and Suarez and announced a broad general policy to the effect that no government would be recognized which did not rest on constitutional elections and which was based on force

and the will of the people.
