

**WAS BOLD ROBBERY**

**Thieves Made a Big Haul From City Filling Station Monday Night**

Some time during the late hours of Monday night thieves broke into the City Filling Station located on the corner of DeKalb and Lytleton streets and got away with auto accessories amounting to around six hundred dollars.

They made an entrance from the front by breaking both window glasses and removing the wall which prevented the window being raised from the outside. Once inside they unlocked front and back doors and it is thought turned on all lights for they made a careful selection of the goods wanted—only taking casings and tubes of the larger and better makes.

A survey of the stock the following morning showed the following goods missing: Six cord and three fabric Brunswick tires, ranging in size from 33x4 to 34x4 1-2; three cord and four fabric Michellins of same size as above 14 inner tubes or Brunswick, India and Lehigh make, to fit above casings; two flashlights, one nickel plate and the other black, and several other smaller articles.

The thieves left no clue. Parties residing nearby saw the car standing in front of the place but paid no attention to it thinking the owner of the garage was inside the building. Nearby towns have been given a description of the goods and asked to be on the lookout for the thieves.

**Some Good Prices Paid For Property in and Near Bethune.**

**Mr. W. L. Kirkland Named With a Salary and Expense Account of \$3,600**

The Kershaw County Board of Commissioners met in special session on Tuesday of this week to look over the petitions that have been in circulation throughout the county asking for an election on the proposed bond issue of \$400,000 for good roads in this county. The commissioners agreed to call for an election and will announce the date of said election at a later date.

The appointment of a road engineer as provided for in the recent act of the general assembly abolishing the office of County Supervisor was also made. The Board appointed Mr. W. Lenox Kirkland of this city, who is a civil engineer. The appointment carries with it a salary and expense account of \$3,600. The salary of the outgoing supervisor was only \$1,400.
