Railroad Shows Deficit

The Northwestern Railroad entering Sumter from Camden and from St. Paul and Wilson's, a road of less than 100 miles of trackage, showed a deficit during the month of June, according to a report filed with the South Carolina Railroad Commission. In June of last year this road was operated at a profit of \$3,138. This June the loss was \$8,050.

This little railroad has made during the first half of the present year net earnings of \$86,553. For the same period of last year the road's total earnings

were \$41,336.

The loss incurred by the road for the month of June, as just reported seems to have been due to heavy expenditures during the month. The company spent during June \$9,987 for maintenance of its way and structures. During the first half of the year the amount spent for this purpose was only \$24,848. For maintenance of equipment in June the road spent \$3,237, as compared with only \$19,491 for the entire first six months of the year. The total earnings were \$20,539. The total earnings for that month were only \$12,489.

Four prohibition officers, J. N. Wood, R. H. Drummond, Jr., R. H. Whitth and J. W. Quigg were acquitted in Federal court in Roanoke, Va., last week, charged with the killing of Hosea Thomas, an alleged bootlegger.

Dr. C. A. Nepea, Federal narcotic officer for North Carolina has caused the arrest of two white men at Mount Airy, N. C. on charges of having stolen narcotics valued at \$3,000 from a drug store in that town.

A Statement From SENATOR E. D. SMITH

Giving the Facts on Roll Calls in Reply to a Circular Issued by H. L. Scaife.

There is being given circulation throughout the state to a pamphlet purporting to come from one H. F. Scaife, of Washington, D. C., making an attack upon my record in the United States Senate. The burden of the publication is that I have neglected my duties as Senator by not attending to some of the roll-calls.

I have challenged comparison of my record in this respect during the campaign and since the issuance of this circular with the average of those Senators who stand high in the Senate and in their respective parties. The challenge was not accepted and for the information of my friends throughout the state I wrote to the Hon. Charles M. Galloway, former Civil Service Commissioner and now practicing attorney in Washington, requesting that he compile from the Congressional Record the record in respect to roll-calls of the following Senators:

Senator Hitchcock, Democrat, Chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee when the Democrats were in control of the Senate, and Democrat leader in the Senate during the treaty fight.

Senator Owen, Democrat, Chairman of the Banking and Currency Committee under Democratic control of the Senate and one of the leading authorities on banking and currency in the country, a candidate for President, endorsed by his state and voted for at San Francisco by his state delegation to the last. Two years ago he was renominated and re-elected by his party with a plurality of 36,000.

Senator Penrose, Republican, Chairman of the Committee on Finance and acknowledged leader of the Republican force, both of the Senate and the country.

Senator Tillman, Democrat, Chairman of the Naval Affairs Committee under the Democrats, whose record as to his diligence and faithful attention to his duties as Senator, as well as to his statesmanship.

Senator John Sharpe Williams, Democrat, whose long service, both as Congressman and Senator, and whose usefulness to his party and nation is unquestioned and who is recognized as the ablest scholar and most forceful debater in House or Senate.
