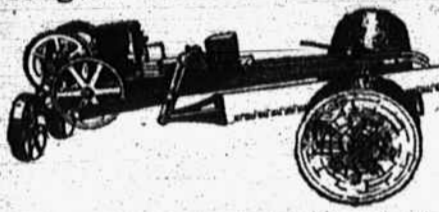

Robbery With Intent to Kill.

Mr. C. A. Brown of this city had a very narrow escape from death on Wednesday evening about 8:30, at the railroad crossing near the Sumter Brick Works. He was attacked by three negro men who held him up and robbed him of \$15 and knocking him senseless, placed him across the railroad track, where he lay unconscious until Mr. C. G. Watts, the proprietor of the Sumter Tobacco Warehouse, found him by the aid of the headlight on an approaching locomotive. Mr. Watts quickly dragged him from the track, and he was taken to the Toumey Hospital, where he is receiving medical attention.

Yesterday morning a negro man reported to the police that while coming from his home in the Mayesville section on the railroad, he had been confronted by three negroes, near the place where Mr. Brown was attacked. These men held him up at the point of their revolvers and relieved him of \$25.00. The police and the deputy sheriff searched the piece of woods carefully but failed to find any trace of the robbers.—Sumter Herald.
