Two Foreign Insect Pests.
Clemson College, Sept. 1.—Two foreign insect pests which are likely to do much damage are being watched closely, says Prof. A. F. Conradi, entomologist; namely, the Mexican bean beetle, which has already reached this state; and the velvet-bean caterpillar, which is rapidly working its way upward from Florida and southern Georgia.

The Mexican bean beetle has been reported by Government scouts at two points in the northwestern corner of this state, viz. Long-Creek and a point near Eastley. The spread of this pest has been so rapid during the spring and summer that it will possibly spread over much territory before being stopped by winter. This is an especially destructive pest to all kinds of beans in the garden and to cowpeas. The grubs, which do the principal feeding, are one-fourth to three-eighths of an inch long, of a bright yellow color, and covered with spines which are branched and colored black at the tips.

The velvet bean caterpillar has been reported by the Florida entomologists to be spreading in central and northern Florida. It is believed that this pest may be expected in southern Georgia in early September, and may reach South Carolina by the middle of September. Throughout Florida this insect is a most serious pest to velvet beans. This caterpillar, when full grown is nearly two inches long. After it is half grown it is generally dark green with prominent bright colored lines with darker borders running lengthwise on the body. Many are pale green with lines either indistinct or absent. The line along the side of the body is wider than those on the back and is often pink or brown. If disturbed it throws itself violently until it reaches the ground.

Prof. Conradi urges that the occurrence of any suspicious insects be reported to the entomology division, Clemson College, S. C., so that steps may be taken to control the pests.

SHORT NEWS STORIES.

Items of Interest gathered from Many Places.

Boyce Holder, a lad of fifteen years, saved his father, E. R. Holder, the manager of a store in the suburbs of Spartanburg from being held up and robbed of \$300 late Saturday night by drawing a pistol from his father's back pocket and firing upon the man who had forced his father to throw up his hands. The boy was accompanying his father when the would-be-highwayman came upon them in the road and demanded that the storekeeper stand and deliver. The man fired upon by the boy escaped in the darkness. According to Mr. Holder, he was carrying with him about \$300, which would have been taken but for the action of his son.

While seated at his desk, A. Mason Gibbs, of Columbia, president of the Gibbs Machinery Co., one of the best known business men in the state, was stricken suddenly and died within five minutes before medical aid could be summoned, about 1:40 o'clock Wednesday afternoon. Rupture of a large blood vessel near the heart was the cause of his death.

Fannie Thornton, 14 year old negro girl, was killed by lightning near Anderson last week. She was picking cotton in a field when the bolt struck her, breaking her neck, fracturing her collar bone and dislocating her hip. Other negroes who were working in the same field did not receive a shock.

Mrs. Sid Hatfield has told how her husband was killed at Welch, West Virginia recently. She says that C. E. Lively, the Baldwin Falls detective, who is charged with the killing did not do it. Sid she says, accompanied by herself, Ed Chambers, and his wife were going up the steps of the Welch courthouse to answer charges that had been made against Sid on connection with a previous shooting affair in the Mohawk valley. Sid she said had not had anything to do with the shooting. Ed Chambers was going along as a witness for Sid. Neither of the men were armed. C. E. Lively claimed that Sid made a motion to draw a pistol and Lively shot him. That is not true, Lively did not see Sid. A crowd of men on the courthouse steps shot Sid and there were thirteen bullets in his body. He never knew what happened. Mrs. Hatfield says she will not go to Welch to testify in the matter unless under the protection of Federal States troops. Her sister, who she would not name before she could say a word. She is not afraid in Maryland, first because she has a good lawyer and knows how to use it, and second because she has friends there.

Rev. P. C. Hickson, of Gaffney, S. C., who was convicted in the federal court in 1918 of violation of the espionage act and sentenced to six months imprisonment was named as moderator of the Broad River Baptist association last Thursday. Owing to the adjournment advanced by President Watson, conducted the prison sentence from time of \$500, which was paid.

S. Commissioner Hitchcock at New York, on Saturday received a package of \$25,000 worth of negotiable treasury certificates, accompanied by a note in which the writer said that the certificates were being restored because his conscience troubled him.

FROM POLE BY WIRELESS PLAN

Capt. Roald Amundsen Hopes to Talk With World While Locked in Ice.

WILL DRIFT PAST THE POLE

Believe Ocean Current Running Northeastly From Cape Serdze Will Carry Him Past Pole and Into Atlantic Ocean.

Seattle, Wash.—From the remotest, most inaccessible spot on earth—the north pole—a wireless message will be flashed to the civilized world, if the plans of Capt. Roald Amundsen, discoverer of the south pole and famous arctic explorer, are carried out.

Captain Amundsen's schooner Maud, on which he hoped to drift past the pole with the ice floes, was disabled by a broken propeller off Cape Siberia, after he had spent two years in pushing around the eastward arctic passage from Norway. The explorer left his vessel and crew to await a break in the ice and proceeded to Nome, later coming to Seattle on a recent ship.

Will install Wireless on Ship. The Maud has no wireless apparatus, but Captain Amundsen expects to install one when the craft is brought here some time this summer to be repaired and refitted. Captain Amundsen explained that his party had been cut off from communication with other human beings for two years, with but one break—his trip out to Nome last year.

"The war was in its most critical period when we left the world," he recalled, "and for months we speculated in vain on the course of events. It was December, 1919, more than a year after the signing of the armistice, that we met a Russian trader who told us what had happened. Then I determined we would carry wireless."

To Sail Next Summer. Captain Amundsen said he would spend the next year in the United States, probably most of it around Seattle, and would sail from this port next summer.

The last voyage tended only to confirm his previous theories about magnetic properties of the polar basin, the explorer affirmed. He expressed faith in his belief that an ocean current running northeastly from Cape Serdze would carry him past the pole and eventually into the Atlantic ocean.

"It will take three years—perhaps longer," he predicted.

Captain Amundsen said that an important part of his equipment consisted of books, hundreds of them.

MEANT TOE FOR FISH BAIT

Man Adrift in Boat Off Nantucket, Mass., Was Going to Cut It Off When Rescued.

Rockland, Me.—After being adrift 12 days in a disabled motorboat, A. B. Tunning of Nantucket, Mass., was rescued by fishermen off the Island of Metinic, 20 miles from here. He was much exhausted and nearly starved.

Tunning left Nantucket on July 13 to go to Plymouth in his motorboat to see the Pilgrim pageant. The engine became disabled off Nantucket and the 42-foot boat drifted to sea in a fog. The man had no nourishment except a little fruit, which he ate early that day, and no fresh water except that caught during occasional showers.

Tunning's hand wandered somewhat after his rescue, but in brief moments he was able to tell briefly of his experiences. He said he was on the point of cutting off a toe to use as bait for fishing if he had to go another day without food.

LAY SLAYING TO GERMANS

Mexican Police Think General Kloss Kried for Telling War Secrets.

Mexico City.—The recent assassination in front of his home here of Gen. Maximiliano Kloss is now believed by the police to have been the work of a German, sent to Mexico to avenge the publication by Kloss of alleged German military secrets.

Kloss, recently published a book on asphyxiating gas and it is said that a group in Germany derived his death as the result.

General Kloss, during the Carranza regime was head of the artillery department and had seen active service.

Returns to Wife Left Alone for 36 Years

Lem Wah, for 33 years an orphan in New York city, returned to his Canadian Pacific home in the north for China to spend the remaining days of his life with his wife, whom he left 36 years ago. He is seventy-two years old, and has been pensioned by the railroad. Lem's pension has been inherited by his son.
