Treaty With Germany.

In his canvas last year, Mr. Harding said if elected he would make peace with Germany. He has carried out that pledge and it only remains to be approved by the Senate to remove the technical war difference between America and Germany. He further stated that he was opposed to a League of Nations and the people endorsed him by the largest majority ever given a presidential candidate.
