MANY MEN TOIL

And Plan For Coming of The Combined Big Show.

One hundred men are working day and night just to let you know that Howe's Great London Circus and Van Amburg's Trained Wild Animals—the new and big combination of two well known and established shows—will come to Camden, Saturday, October 15th.

These men are the advertising agents, advance managers, bill posters, lithographers and banner men of the big show's advance. Besides this force there are local contracting agents, special contracting agents, railroad contracting agents, press agents—all arranging for the coming of the show—supplies, transportation, publicity and permits.

So, on circus morn when the four Howe-Van Amburg trains pull into town, you'll know that many men have toiled and planned so that the big tents may rise on time, the two-mile parade may proceed on a practically route, the big show doors may open on time.

Back with the show are eleven hundred people, five hundred and fifty horses and three hundred wild animals, with nineteen elephants and a flock of ponies swelling the total. The double menagerie will be a treat, indeed, as will the thrilling wild animal acts which form a background for the three-ring, two-stage circus program presented by three hundred and eighty-four European, South American and American circus stars. The big top of the show, with its patent grand stands, which unfold from thirty special wagons, seats twelve thousand people.

Destroy Cotton Stalks Now.

Clemson College, Oct. 4.—The early fall destruction of cotton stalks is the most important single step in any fight against the boll weevil. So says Prof. A. F. Conrad, entomologist, who adds that it has been shown time and again in practice and by experiments that the most favorable condition for the boll weevil to pass the winter successfully are found in those fields in which the cotton stalks, together with grass weeds, fallen leaves and other refuse are left undisturbed until nearly time to plant the following season. On such fields the greatest number of weevils will survive, and every farmer should ask himself the question, "Will I permit my farm to be a winter hotel for the pest?"

In other words, will the farmer choose to destroy the weevil this fall or have the weevil destroy his cotton next season. The earlier the stalks are destroyed the fewer weevils will survive the winter. In infested fields it is common to find weevils at the rate of five to twenty-five thousand per acre at the time of first frost. It is a well known fact that the weevils developing late in the fall are the ones most likely to survive the winter, as they are not worn out by long flights and the rearing of the young as are the older weevils. For this reason development of weevils in late fall must be prevented as the first step in making the next cotton crop.

Therefore we should start now a cleaning campaign such as South Carolina has never before witnessed. The boll weevil is a pest with a terrible amount of fight, and to meet this situation our farmers must develop the best fighting spirit of which they are capable.

Early stalk destruction and clean farming with cover crops, constitute the most powerful gun that can be used against the pest at this time. Whatever method of cleaning is employed, one thing is certain: The weevils' winter hotels must be destroyed. In the words of general Neville before Verdun, "They shall not pass."

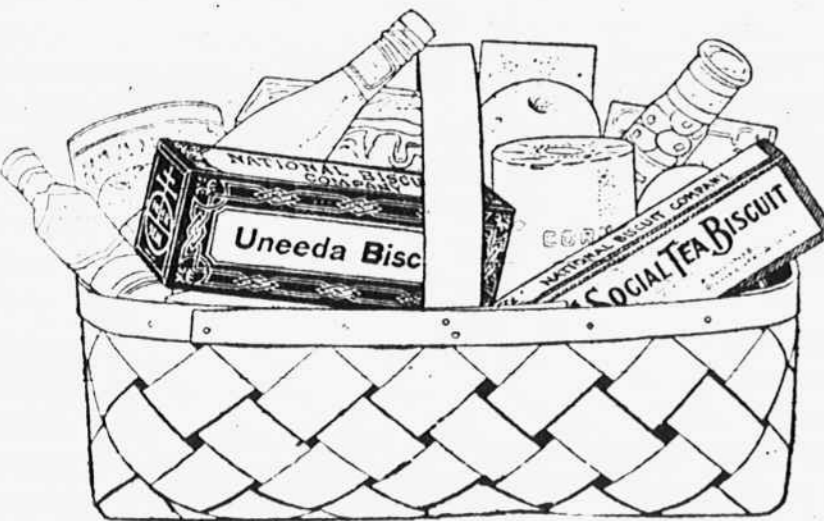

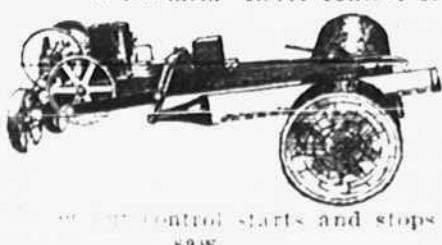
