Hit Twice in Same Place.

Engineer Lloyd McNair, who runs on trains Nos. 117 and 118 between Yorkville and Columbia, was telling Tuesday evening of a man named Truesdale who was hit by train No. 114 at a crossing just north of Hanging Rock tank in Kershaw county, Tuesday morning. "This same man was hit by the same train at the same crossing about eight months ago, and the big automobile he was driving was smashed to splinters. He suffered a broken leg at that time and today he had his automobile smashed and had the same leg broken in the same place. He was brought up to Fennell's on our train this evening. There was a negro with him in the car, but the negro, who was also badly hurt, wasn't brought to the hospital." Asked if he had ever run into an automobile, Engineer McNair laughed and said, "Once—about ten months ago. I was going down the road at about twenty-five miles an hour. The public road runs alongside the track and there was a car going the same way that I was. There was a young fellow and a couple of ladies in the car and he was catching me. I knew the crossing was ahead and remarked to my friend, 'Watch out for that fellow.' The automobile driver got in ahead of me, going at a pretty lively clip. When about 100 yards from the crossing the front wheels stalled. I applied the brakes and brought the train almost to a stop and barely hit the automobile hard enough to bend the back fenders. I got down and walked around to the side where the young fellow was, and inquired, 'Say, young fellow, are you trying to commit suicide?' He was pretty mad and talked a lot about suing the road for damages, but I never heard anything more of it. The whole party was out of the car when I hit it. He got in and raised me into Camden and got there before I did."—York Enquirer.
