### SLAUGHTER ESCAPES

Only To Be Slain Later By Fellow Convict.

Little Rock, Ark., Dec. 9.—Tom Slaughter, notorious bandit, under death sentence for the killing of a trusty guard at the state prison farm at Tucker, escaped from the penitentiary here at 2:30 o'clock this morning, taking six other convicts with him. For hours prior to his escape, Slaughter was in complete control of the penitentiary yards and offered liberty to all convicts who wanted it.

Four negroes, who fled, were under death sentences. The six Phillips county negroes, under death sentence for participating in the race riots in 1919, refused to leave the prison.

Some one smuggled a revolver to Slaughter in the death cell and thus armed, he outwitted the trusty guards assigned to watch him and took complete charge of the penitentiary.

Warden E. H. Dempsey and Mrs. Dempsey and their son and two daughters were locked in the death cell by the bandit.

Slaughter escaped in an automobile belonging to Mrs. Dempsey, which was standing in the penitentiary yards.

At 3 o'clock this morning Slaughter passed through Banton, about 25 miles south of Little Rock and engaged in a gun battle with the city marshal who had been notified of the escape and was on the look out.

After his escape it developed that, feigning illness, Slaughter succeeded in getting a guard to open his cell door about 9:30 o'clock last night. He held up this guard and another standing nearby with his smuggled pistol, took theirs and then forced them to go ahead of him to the stockade, where their presence admitted them and permitted him to overpower the one guard on duty there.

Slaughter then opened the cells and offered all the prisoners liberty.

Only six took advantage of the offer and the others, with two of the guards were locked up. He next took one of the guards to the office of the penitentiary with him and took possession of it, turning the guards on duty over to the men who elected to escape with him.

Next he went to the hospital and forced a trained nurse to precede him to the apartments just outside the walls occupied by Warden Dempsey and his family. The nurse awakened them and Slaughter then forced them to accompany him to the death cell,

where they were locked up. He told them he would not harm them and later, showing a peculiar trait of character, brought them a pot of coffee. Slaughter then threw the gates of the penitentiary wide open and leisurely set about fitting himself and companions with civilian clothes from the commissary, escaping in an automobile about 2:30.

Little Rock, Dec. 9.—(By the Associated Press).—Tom Slaughter, desperado, came to the end of his long career of crime tonight in the fastness of the Saline County hills. He was shot from behind by one of the white men who he led to liberty from the State penitentiary this morning.

The report of Slaughter's death was confirmed late tonight by Sheriff J. J. Crow, of Saline County, leader of one of the many posses on the killer's trail.

Not only is Slaughter dead, but one of the five negroes who fled the prison with him in the spectacular escape this morning, is dying in the hills beside the bandit's body, while the white companion who shot him down from behind and the three other negroes are in custody.

The man who killed Slaughter is J. C. Howard, of Garland County, who was serving a three-year term for forgery. The scene of the shooting is fourteen miles northwest of Benton in the deep woods.

Howard, according to a statement he made at the jail in Benton late tonight, had been biding his time to turn upon Slaughter.

"I left with him with the intention of killing him the first chance I got," he is quoted as saying.

Slaughter fell with two bullets in his head and another through the body.

The negro who is dying beside Slaughter's corpse, received his wound early this morning at Benton, an hour after the flight from Little Rock during the battle between four officers in the main street of the town and the fleeing bandits in their automobile.
